

The Banks Peninsula Walking Festival is about to begin. Ticket sales have been amazing with many of the long walks sold out already. Some of the shorter walks close to home still have some spare places.

Urumau Reserve has been in the news a lot with the new Development Plan. Maybe you have never been there? There is more to the hill than just walking and cycling paths. If you'd like a closer look at the native plants in the reserve this is a very interesting walking tour. Brian Downey has been leading community teams for years planting in this reserve. He can share his knowledge of the plantings and the regenerating bush in the reserve. Brian's walk is Sunday November 11th.

Over in Diamond Harbour Pete Ozich recently won a Community Service Award for his inspiring Pete's Path and other conservation projects he's been involved with. Like Brian Pete has been helping grow native bush over in Diamond Harbour for years. This year Pete's walk follows the coastal track from Diamond Harbour to Purau then heads back on a historic stock route to return via Morgan's Gully. Pete will describe his successful battle against wanton banana passion fruit and the transformation of the reserve to healthy beauty! This is a very inspiring walk and shows how a great idea and working with community can create something marvellous. Pete's walk is Saturday November 17th.

Back in Lyttelton Wendy Everingham will lead a walk that looks at the history of the native planting projects

in the Lyttelton area. Starting at the Community Garden this walk will head through the township and down to the new marina and then along the coast to Cass Bay and finish at a well kept secret – a community nursery that has been running for 20 years! As the walk ambles along she will also give snippets of information on general history of the area. This walk is Sunday November 18th.

Sarah Pritchett has a new idea for a coast amble. A "Plauk"!

A "plauk" you ask? What on earth is that? Answer – it's your opportunity to give something back to the earth, meet a passionate local waste-buster, and take a leisurely stroll from beautiful Cass Bay to Te Ana Marina, enhancing the environment by picking up any litter you find en-route. Te Ana

Officially Opened

Lyttelton's custom built Te Ana Marina has been formally opened. Te Ana can be translated to mean


"Resting Place," or "Place of Refuge". Peter Davies, the CEO of Lyttelton Port Company felt the name was really suitable as a place where boats could shelter.

"This project began as a consequence of the Lyttelton Port Recovery Plan. We kept hearing from the public that they wanted access to the water" he said. The new facility certainly provides that. A water front walk is something that has been missing from Lyttelton for so many years. Now the township is connected to the marina both by foot and road. This is the first step in the revival of this area. Peter Davie challenged the City Council to improve Godley Quay and Naval Point so the city would finally have an amazing water facility for Christchurch.

"My husband and I were really blown away when we saw the completed Marina" said Mayor Lianne Dalziel. She revealed that she and her husband lived in Lyttelton in the 1990's and had many fond memories from that time. "When I was elected to Parliament in the 90's we left the town but I clearly remember lobbying for the Marina 5-6 years after being elected".

She also agreed with the CEO of the Port Company that the Marina was just the beginning of the upgrade for this area. The Council's Naval Point Plan will also bring many long awaited benefits to an area that has been very run down for a very long period of time.

When you visit this newly developed area you'll find a series of interesting information boards on the history of the area. The restored Woolshed will eventually become home



to several businesses. The waterfront area has been developed tastefully. There are plenty of places to rest your legs with quite a few seats made from recycled wharf timbers. An office exists for the marina berth holders with some facilities for them. By Lyttelton standards there is also a decent sized car parking area that has been nicely landscaped by Fulton Hogan.

Te Ana marina is a welcome addition to our town.

New campaign targets summer water use

Christchurch people are being encouraged to cut back on their water use so work can continue on upgrading the city's below ground well heads over the summer months.

"We need to keep water use down over the summer if we want to continue the well head and pump station work that we need to do to improve our water supply network," says Council Water Supply Programme Manager Helen Beaumont.

Hand-held hoses are best for watering the garden.

"Normally in the summer when it is hot and everyone is out watering their gardens we need to draw water from all our wells to keep up with the demand.

"This summer we want to be able shut down some of the wells so we can continue the work to convert the below ground well heads to above ground well heads. That is only going to be possible if people cut back on their water use, which is why we are asking people to conserve water.

"The less water you use, the faster we can work, which is our best chance of ending temporary chlorination sooner," Ms Beaumont says.

"We will be rolling out a campaign over the coming months in which we will sharing tips on easy ways to cut back on your water use. As part of that campaign we'll be encouraging people to water their garden at most, every second day, using hand-held hoses rather than sprinklers or irrigation systems.

"We will also be asking people not to water their lawn," Ms Beaumont says. "In Christchurch this summer a

brown lawn is going to be a beautiful thing."

Council staff will be closely monitoring water consumption over the summer and, if need be, level 3 water restrictions will be introduced.

Level 3 restrictions mean you can only use hand held hoses to water your garden and only between the hours of 9pm and 7am on alternate days.

Key water saving tips

- Water your garden before 7am or after 9pm.
- Avoid watering in strong winds as it quickly evaporates the water.
- If you're washing your car, do it on the lawn so you're watering the lawn at the same time.
- Keep children's paddling pools covered with a tarpaulin when not in use to keep rubbish out so you can use the water for several days in a row. When you need to change the water, use a bucket to empty the water from the paddling pool into your garden.
- Keep showers under five minutes to save up to 3700 litres of water a month.
- Up to 20 per cent of household water use is for washing clothes. Cutting one load a week could save 50 litres so wait until you have a full load before washing

A New Short Film: What Logan Did

A new short film is about to be launched by an emerging film maker. As we speak director Jane Mahoney from Lyttelton is about to head north to Auckland for the launching of her film "What Logan Did". Her film is one of ten supported by Loading Docs.

Loading Docs is an initiative to foster film making talent within New Zealand. Each year since 2014 ten three minute films have been selected. The films are to inspire people both locally and internationally while exposing the film makers to mentoring support from the wider industry. The lucky chosen ten films are then given very wide exposure. "Their work will be seen on Air New Zealand flights, at various international film festivals, TVNZ OnDemand and for a select few people there will be a full size screening in Christchurch next week", said Jane.

Each year the Loading Docs team selects a theme for the short films. For 2018 the theme was IMPACT. To get inspiration for her film Jane was keen to pursue people who have great ideas. Entrepreneurs came to her mind immediately. The University of Canterbury's Summer Start Up Programme was the place she headed for inspiration. It was here she was really inspired by the work of twenty two year old South Canterbury entrepreneur Logan Williams. Logan had a dream to rid our rivers of the invasive algae Didymo.

"Logan had seen the impact of Didymo in his local rivers while growing up. He set himself the mission

to rid New Zealand's rivers of it. I was so impressed by him. Not only did he want to get rid of the algae he also wanted to turn it into a versatile plastic substitute that was biodegradable, waterproof, fireproof, recyclable, durable, non-toxic and machine washable!" Logan created a process turning Didymo to Bioplastic!

Logan's story was turned into film in July of last year. Jane assembled a team to visit the Tekapo River.

For Jane that was her first encounter with Didymo. "It is so disgusting," she said. She thinks there are over 150 South Island Rivers infected by this! She is so inspired by the work Logan has done and is very pleased that this film will highlight his amazing work.

"Logan is the first person to tackle New Zealand's Didymo problem by removing it from the waterways - up until now the emphasis has been solely on a prevention campaign, aimed at stopping its spread. By developing a commercial use for Didymo, Logan hopes to provide an incentive for the algae to be harvested, giving native flora and fauna the chance to re-establish themselves in our waterways".

Jane thinks Logan has a really bright future. "He's also developed a process where spirulina helps clean up effluent waste on dairy farms".

Jane has been involved in and around the screen industry for years. She has mostly been involved with making commercial advertisements. She moved to Lyttelton several years before the earthquakes and now calls Corsair Bay home. Her day job is facilitating film shoots for ad makers on the South Island and her afterhours work is fascinating projects like this short film. She has really enjoyed her directing role in this short film.

A good news story from last year came from the Lyttelton Library. Staff there decided to recycle their rubbish. At the end of three weeks they had full rubbish bins with very little going to land fill.

"We had just got out of the habit after the move – we always used to do this so the challenge was a good way just to make time to get back into it" said Lindsey Melcher.

Another group in our community to participate last year were the diners at Lyttelton Community House. The regulars on Tuesday created a noticeboard focusing on what they were eating and how they were feeling. They talked about reducing their sugar intake. What foods did they need to focus on? Carbohydrate reduction

was another goal for some lunch participants. Other ideas they came up with focused on eating more leafy greens, eating more local food, swapping cage eggs for free range, reusing packaging, growing more food and sharing food with neighbours.

This year Wendy is thinking about keeping in more regular contact with some of her friends from the Information Centre. She's going to organise a series of coffee catch ups.

Twenty Five Year Campaign Some Success for Boat Safety

James Ensor has been heading up a Boat Safety Campaign for Lyttelton Harbour since 1993! Lack of facilities for Christchurch people to safely launch and retrieve their boats into the harbour has been the issue he and his team have pursued for so many years. "The new marina at Magazine Bay in 2000 brought some hope for safer facilities but that infamous southerly storm put pay to all of that".

With nothing happening for local sail boat owners, James and his team officially began the Boat Safety Group in 2009.

"It's been a very long haul" he said. "So many meetings, presentations, deputations.....".

All that hard work has finally been rewarded. This year the Christchurch City Council approved 10.6 million for the Naval Point Development Plan. Whilst there will be a public consultation process shortly to get a steer on the priorities of the wider community for the area, James is certain a substantial sum will be spent improving boat safety at the slipway.

Paula Smith the former Chair of the Lyttelton Mount Herbert Community Board was one of the people who stood shoulder to shoulder with the team in their effort to make the harbour safer. At a recent meeting of the Boat Safety Advisory Group they celebrated their successes. A surprise presentation saw Paula Smith acknowledged by James's team with a lovely harbour painting for all her efforts to ensure this project was accepted as a council supported project.

"Paula was key to our successful application. She got the project registered within the council system early on. Things then flowed smoothly for our group when submitting our ideas into the Christchurch City Council Long Term Plan. We really wanted to thank her for her efforts", said James.



With City Council support for the Naval Point Development Plan and \$10.6 million allocated in the Long Term Plan the vision for safer boating in the harbour can be achieved.

After all these years this is certainly a success story.

Call for feedback on Banks Peninsula speed limits

The Council's Traffic and Parking Bylaw allows it to set and change speed limits on roads but consultation is required as part of the process.

After consultation closes the Banks Peninsula Community Board will consider a staff report that includes public feedback and will then make a recommendation to the Council.

Whakaraupō Mātaitai

Bylaw options for community engagement – October 2018

Background

The Whakaraupō Mātaitai Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki and their Advisory Group (the managers) have developed a suite of bylaw options for the Lyttelton community to consider.

In developing these bylaw options, the managers considered that daily bag limit reductions and/or prohibitions (rāhui) may all be necessary to reduce fishing pressure on iconic shellfish, finfish and native seaweed species within the mātaitai in order to build future abundance.


Local knowledge indicates that fish stocks in the mātaitai are nowhere near as abundant and accessible as they were in the past. Many of the bylaw options are also supported by research undertaken by Te Tiaki Mahinga Kai – a research and monitoring support team (for customary fishing protection area managers) centred at the University of Otago.

The managers have proposed the following bylaw options to increase access to important fish stocks in the mātaitai for customary fishers (in line with the mātaitai status of the area) and recreational fishers who have less capacity (e.g. small boats).


