LYTTELTON'S NAVAL POINT PILE REMOVAL WORK DELAYED

The removal of remnant piles to improve navigation and public safety at Lyttelton's Naval Point has been delayed and is now expected to start at the end of this month.

The old concrete piles from the planned Magazine Bay Marina are going to be removed.

The 52 concrete piles – originally from the planned Magazine Bay Marina that was devastated by a storm in 2000 – were set to be removed during April.

However, equipment required for the removal project was needed on the West Coast to help with the clean-up there following March's devastating flooding.

The work will now begin in the last week of May and is expected to take four weeks, depending on sea and weather conditions.

Christchurch City Council Head of Parks Andrew Rutledge says it was important for the equipment to have been diverted to help on the West Coast.

"Although this has caused a small delay we are happy the pile removal will start at the end of the month, improving the safety of the popular recreational spot for the different people and groups that use the bay for water activities."

The removal is exciting news for the many groups that use the area, as well as the wider community, with them all identifying the piles as a significant navigation and public safety hazard.

The removed piles will become part of the Lyttelton Port Company's reclamation work, saving on disposal costs.

A wider piece of work is being carried out by the Council to develop Naval Point, which will involve public consultation later this year.

"We greatly appreciated all the support and involvement in the Festival of Lights and thank everyone for all the help in making it such a success," Claire said.


The time was right for a change in focus, and the feedback had been overwhelmingly positive, she said.

GOVERNORS BAY PUMP STATION NOW ONLINE

Lyttelton Harbour is a step closer to being a healthier place to swim and fish since the routine discharge of treated wastewater from Governors Bay has ended.

A new pump station is now pumping all of Governors Bay's treated wastewater - an average of 136,000 litres per day - through a new submarine pipeline to Lyttelton.

Wastewater from Governors Bay is now being conveyed by submarine pipe to Lyttelton.

At Lyttelton it is being treated temporarily at the Cashin Quay pump station until the \$53 million Lyttelton Harbour Wastewater Project is completed early next year.

Christchurch City Council City Services General Manager David Adamson says the Lyttelton Harbour Wastewater Project will put an end to the routine discharge of treated wastewater into Lyttelton Harbour.

"The commissioning of the Governors Bay pump station is a fantastic milestone and another step closer to cleaner water in Lyttelton Harbour," Mr Adamson says.

"The Lyttelton Harbour Wastewater Project will improve wastewater services in Lyttelton, Governors Bay and Diamond Harbour, an end goal we're all committed to."

Up until now wastewater from Lyttelton, Governors Bay and Diamond Harbour has been treated at wastewater treatment plants in each of the townships before being discharged through outfall pipelines into Lyttelton Harbour.

Under the new scheme, existing wastewater treatment plants at Cashin Quay, Governors Bay and Diamond Harbour are being converted into pump stations to pipe all of Lyttelton Harbour's wastewater through the Lyttelton Tunnel.

The Council is working with Environment Canterbury, Te Hapū o Ngāti Wheke, Te Rūnanga o Ngāi Tahu and Lyttelton Port Company and harbour communities to improve water quality in Lyttelton Harbour as part of the Waka-Ora Healthy Harbour Plan.

Mr Adamson says the Lyttelton Harbour Wastewater Project is a practical solution to improving the health of our harbour for future generations to enjoy.

SCIENCE IRREFUTABLE

CLIMATE EMERGENCY DECLARED

Environment Canterbury declared a climate emergency at its May 16th council meeting highlighting both the urgent need to address the issue and the work already being done to help the region respond.

“Climate change presents significant challenges, risks and opportunities to Canterbury and we’ve long acknowledged the urgent need to address climate change for the benefit of current and future generations.

The Council’s role is to support the region and its communities to better understand and proactively respond”, deputy chair Peter Scott says.

“We have no doubt at Council that urgency is required – the science is irrefutable and we have for some time now, been responding accordingly”.

The Council was challenged to make this statement by the local branch of Extinction Rebellion. As a result of their hard efforts the council affirmed the following statement:

The Council affirmed the following statement:

“Environment Canterbury recognises the importance of an urgent need to address climate change for the benefit of current and future generations.

The science is irrefutable – climate change is already impacting ecosystems and communities around the world, with increasingly frequent and severe storms, floods and droughts; melting polar ice sheets; sea level rise and coastal inundation and erosion; and impacts on biodiversity including species loss and extinction.

The IPCC’s Special Report in October 2018 stated that we have twelve years to turn greenhouse gas emissions around to limit global warming to the Paris Agreement target of 1.5-degrees, or face an uncertain future.

This requires ‘rapid and far-reaching transitions in energy, land, urban and infrastructure (including transport and buildings), and industrial systems.

Everyone has a role to play in delivering the change required.”

Local Extinction Rebellion member Sara Campbell was delighted with the announcement but qualified her statement by saying “This was a positive step but was just the beginning.”

Christchurch City Council will also be considering their support next week.

Day by day more and more information becomes available about our local and wider environments. To get a greater understanding about New Zealand, the Ministry of Environment in their State of the Environment Report 2019 gives us an opportunity to actually see what the state of play is.

“This report provides evidence to enable all of us to have an open and honest conversation about what we have, what we are at risk of losing, and where we can make changes”.

The Ministry has produced a series of graphics that show snap shots of things that are actually happening on the ground. Included is their snapshot of the impacts of climate change already in New Zealand.

The urgency of our climate emergency is clear. The challenges are how we translate it to direct actions. In the near future in Lyttelton it is proposed that a series of speakers will present information on local initiatives that are already addressing species extinction and climate change head on and no doubt the conversation will widen to include other initiatives that could happen and how you can get involved.

RĀPAKI CHURCH RE-OPENS – A SPECIAL CELEBRATION

One hundred and fifty years ago, on May the 4th 1869, Rāpaki community and whānau celebrated the opening of their Church. The momentous occasion was reported in the Lyttelton Times. It reported that the celebration was attended by local Europeans and Maori and that an interdenominational service was held. The sun shone. Fast forward to May 4th 2019 and the picture was almost identical.

Since inception the Rāpaki church was predominantly Methodist however in later years it supported Anglican, Presbyterian and Wesleyan ministries.

The quaint little church was closed following the 2010-2011 earthquakes and the re-opening celebration coincided with its sesquicentennial. The church has been central to Rāpaki life over the past 150 years. Kaumatua Donald Couch has written a history of this little church to coincide with its re-opening.

Donald said “The driving force for the restoration was the values it represented. The repairs and restoration were a necessary investment in recognizing the past and providing for the future”.

The church itself is actually owned by the community of Rāpaki and is administered by six Rāpaki Reserve Trustees. It has been the trustees’ job to return an operational church to the community. Since 2011 trustees have been planning to make this happen. After funding was obtained in 2017, the restoration work began.

Matua Rewi Couch, one of the Reserve Trustee’s, has played a significant role making this happen.

“I’m delighted that the Church is functioning again and to re-open on the day of the 150th anniversary is a really nice achievement”. Rewi’s whānau has always had a very close association with the church since its opening in 1869.

The restoration has been completed by local Lyttelton people. Tony Ussher was the Conservation Architect. Tim Simmance, Ian Stewart, Micha Engelmann and Bobby



Botha were key tradesmen during the refurbishment over the last two years.

Micha highlighted some of the restoration work that he was involved with.


“I helped reconstruct the spire. The cedar shingles have been shaped and are held in place by lead roof flashing. That is my specialization. The back wall also needed partial replacement and I helped remove some of the rotten kahikatea and tōtara timbers and replaced it with new timber. I am very happy with the end result”.

Restorations also included the replacement of the rotten main window with a replica of an earlier window based on an old photograph. The fence surrounding the church was built in a style based on an 1871 painting. The fence posts were made from the old Ōtamahua (Quail Island) jetty.

All the restoration work was completed with an emphasis on ‘minimum intervention’ to ensure that the cultural heritage value of the church has been left intact. That means the church pews still have names etched into them from days gone by!

The minimum intervention approach was particularly appreciated by Victoria Bliss a guest who is a heritage professional. “The church reflects the needs of the people. It’s simple and sympathetic to its environment and it’s wonderful to have another heritage building brought back to life after the earthquakes”.

Once all the invited guests had arrived, a pōwhiri was held followed by an interdenominational church service, just



like the opening event 150 years ago. A celebratory lunch followed. A highlight was a delectable cake made to look like the newly opened church.

Rāpaki Church is happily open again to serve the needs of the whānau into the future.

SUSTAINABLE LIVING WEEK AT LYTTTELTON LIBRARY

For the week of 10-15 June, Lyttelton Library is planning a programme of talks, displays and activities to promote the Sustainable Living series being rolled out around the Christchurch City Libraries network in support of the renewable energy policy of the Christchurch City Council.

This programme includes an upcycling craft activity for children, Storytimes with a sustainable

theme, and a drop-in opportunity on the Saturday morning for people to find out just what they

should be putting in their red, green and yellow CCC bins. And all week long, from 10am opening on Monday 10 June, we will have our central table taken over by the Great Stash Swap – bring along any unwanted fabric, lace and trimmings, wool etc, and take home that piece of fabric you didn't know you really needed. No cash involved.

A special feature is a talk on the evening of Tuesday 11 June at 7pm on the Whaka-Ora Healthy

Harbour collaboration between Environment Canterbury, Christchurch City Council, Lyttelton Port Company, Te Hapū o Ngāti Wheke and Te Rūnanga o Ngāi Tahu to develop a catchment management plan for Whakaraupō/Lyttelton Harbour. This initiative will see these organisations working with the community and other stakeholders to plan and coordinate restoration of the ecological and cultural health of the harbour.

And on the evening of Thursday 13 June there will be a community information evening from 6pm until 9pm, which will give local organisations and groups a chance to share information and ideas on living in a more sustainable way. Local groups will have the opportunity to mount a small display and make themselves available for discussion about their projects.

During the evening a panel of speakers will each take 5-7 minutes to talk about their activities, and answer questions. As of now we have Georgina from the CCC environmental unit talking about their promotion of edible gardens, Kim and Crystal from the Lyttelton Port Company, Jozefa and her collaboration with Eruption Brewery, and Jesse from Prima Roastery and the part composting plays in their coffee business.

Representatives from the Yoogo car-sharing scheme will be present and we're anticipating that interested punters may be able to take an e-vehicle for a test drive.

Stoddart Cottage Gallery


3 May – 26 May 2019

REGREENING PORT HILLS GET INVOLVED NOW

Recently an article about re-greening the Port Hills was published that attracted much local comment and support.

The Lyttelton Reserves Management Committee has been actively greening Urumau Reserve for over 10 years. After a brief hiatus due to the earthquakes, the planting programme in Urumau Reserve started back in 2015 and has been running full steam ever since. And you can really see the results! Just look at our 2015 photo compared to our 2019 photo and you can clearly see just how quickly our native trees grow into a forest.

This year marks 5 years since planting resumed. In this time, our community has planted 1300 plants which are sourced from our unique ecological district. Of these plants, an astounding 95% or more have survived thanks to our waterers and plant carers. When you consider the number of plants and size of the area, this amazing result could only be achieved with the help and support of the community.

It's a huge amount of time and energy to achieve forest regrowth and if you ever wondered why some plantings look better than others it's generally related to the resources that are available to the project. This project is a 100% volunteer effort and when you get community by-in, many residents are willing to spare that bit extra to make it happen.

Would you like to get involved? Maybe you have noticed the "greening"? Now is your chance to find out what it's all about.

THE DEVLIN AFFAIR

'I do wish you'd shut up, Sid,' said James

Hobson, wiping beer foam from his mouth with the back of his hand. Those at the bar of the Wheatsheaf Tavern, smiled — Sid Peel was known as the local know-all.

'What you have just said is entirely wrong. The Devlin's were definitely from Irish stock, but saying they came to New Zealand to escape punishment from the IRA is utter rubbish.' The bar crowd drew closer, sensing a story. 'I knew the Devlin's, as much as anyone could, they were very private people,' continued James.

'They had secrets to hide, didn't I just say that?' Sid butted in, amid cries to pipe down.

James continued unabated. 'They came south after the senior Devlin's died in a severe storm in the Hawke's Bay area. There was extensive flooding, and their bodies were swept away among piles of trees and debris and remained hidden for months. On recovery, the bodies were unrecognisable, so DNA samples had to be taken to confirm their identities. It was all in the newspapers at the time, a shocking business.'

'All I'm saying is we never got to hear the whole Devlin story,' said Sid.

James ignored him and took another sip from his beer and looked around.

'Want to hear the real facts of the Devlin story, not the gossip?' The regulars nodded and were joined by others from the adjacent tables, eager to listen.

'Brendan and Kathleen Devlin wanted to put the North Island tragedy behind them, so, they toured the South Island, inspecting various properties that were for sale. For obvious reasons, they insisted that only flood-free farms would be suitable. Finally, they chose to settle on three blocks of hilly land at the back of Camp Bay. They were a reclusive couple. Most people put it down to Kathleen being hearing impaired. Brendan was fluent in sign language, and it was amazing to see their closeness. He was protective of her because he loved her. She was an attractive woman with long black hair, she worn loose about her shoulders. Kathleen's good looks attracted attention from many young guys.

They set up a goat breeding unit and made beautiful cheeses. Unfortunately, there wasn't the taste locally for their products back then. Brendan had to travel long distances to find buyers,' James paused briefly to order another drink. 'Maybe that was the reason Kathleen

became pregnant,' he continued. 'She lacked company, and thought a wee one would help fill the gap. As their veterinarian, I visited them regularly to check on their goat herd. I could see she was lonely.

Anyway, about that time the Andersons moved into Diamond Harbour, with their daughter, Pippa. Kathleen heard that their two-year-old was also deaf. When she took it upon herself to teach the girl signing, the child spent much of her time with the Devlin's. Ron Anderson insisted he drive his daughter to and from Camp Bay, sometimes staying overnight, citing how dangerous the shingle roads were in the dark. Once Kathleen's condition became apparent the rumours started. To some it was obvious. A husband spending so much time away, a lonely wife putting herself forward to help another — it all added up.

The speculations about the Devlin affair went on and on. Finally, Kathleen gave birth to a son, who did not inherit his mother's impediment.

'So, that's why her husband took off then, eh?' the barman said.

'No, it wasn't, Wally. Brendan Devlin had fallen for a girl he met in Palmerston North. Her father owned two or three supermarkets up there, where he sold Brendan's goat cheese. One thing led to another as they say, and the girl, I can't remember her name now, was carrying Brendan's child,' James said?

'Didn't I say he was a bad lot?' Sid could hardly contain his need to be proved right.

'If I may finish? The thing was when Brendan's son arrived, Kathleen was present at the birth and was said to be in raptures with her nephew.

There was stunned silence in the bar, as everyone tried to absorb this new information.

'What the hell?' said Sid. 'In case you haven't guessed, Brendan and Kathleen Devlin, were brother and sister,' said James.

'But who fathered Kathleen's baby?' asked Wally.

'Ah! Kathleen never revealed who her lover was and moved away just days after the birth. Brendan relocated the business to the Manawatu. But I did hear later that she married a land agent and had another son,' James said, turning away from the crowd. Only Wally saw the wry smile flash across his face.



OUR STORIES PROJECT

LPC has given its support to a local storytelling project that aims to connect people and put the stories of everyday people on the streets. Our Stories Project was founded, with LPC support, in 2016.

The pilot project has come to life in Lyttelton over the last three years with Lyttelton Primary School children interviewing people who spent their childhoods here. Children asked questions like, “What was your favourite fish and chip shop?” and “What was the naughtiest thing you did at school?” They also asked about memories of specific events. The participants - aged 25-98 - remembered many port-related events, from farewelling the Wellington ferry to the day the crane fell over.

Many of the people interviewed were children of port workers and they had fond memories of running wild in the port and even swimming in the dry dock, which was used for Christchurch schools swimming sports in its early years.

Project founder Kris Herbert says the interview process is an important part of the project. “Sharing stories is a really powerful thing. The kids are learning to listen and connect. They are learning empathy for other people and understanding what life was like in their town in the past. The participants benefit, too. They always leave grateful for the experience.”

For each interview, the audio is recorded and then the Our Stories team edits the stories and matches them to

places. These location-specific stories are uploaded to the Our Stories App so that anyone can discover them and experience them.

“It’s interesting to hear about the legend of the goat man that scared kids in the 70s, 80s and 90s. But when you listen in the cemetery that he was thought to ‘haunt’ - that’s a whole different experience,” Kris says.

“This magic of bringing stories and places together is what really drives this part of the project.”

LPC has supported Our Stories this year so that the non-profit project can make the experience available for free.

“Our first model was to charge a small amount for the downloads, but that wasn’t ideal. With LPC support, we can make this free for everyone, which is much more in line with the aims of Our Stories.”

Our Stories Project plans to continue with another round of interviews at Lyttelton Primary School this year so that more stories can be added to the app. The project is also looking at expanding to other communities. The stories and app links are available www.ourstoriesproject.org

WATER CHLORINATION UPDATE

About 90 per cent of Christchurch's water supply is expected to be chlorine-free by the end of this month.

The well head improvement programme has been boosted by water restrictions and cooler weather reducing the demand for water.

The water supply is forecast to be completely chlorine-free by spring this year.

Up to last month, 42 out of 140 wells had been upgraded and signed off as secure.

Improvement works are under way or scheduled for a further 54 wells over the winter months.



Report issues from your mobile phone

The Snap Send Solve app works by identifying the location the photo is taken using the phone's GPS data.

It sends an email to the Council from your email address, including the incident type, notes, address of incident, photo, and contact details.

The report is then allocated to the relevant Council department.

The more information provided, the better we can help isolate and investigate the issue.

SURVEY LOOKS AT CHRISTCHURCH RESIDENTS' VIEWS ABOUT CLIMATE CHANGE

“Climate change leadership is a strategic priority for the Council and we are committed to doing all we can to reduce the city’s carbon emissions and to prepare the city for the opportunities and challenges presented by climate change,” says Council Head of Strategic Policy Emma Davis.

“As an organisation we have already set ourselves the goal of being carbon neutral by 2030. Now, as part of our Climate Change Strategy, we are in the process of setting a carbon neutral target for Christchurch as a whole.


