EXHIBITION SHINES A LIGHT ON 160 YEARS OF CHRISTCHURCH LIBRARIES

When Christchurch residents borrowed their first books from a local library, it was from a single room on High St in 1859. Now we can choose to visit the flagship central library Tūranga or one of 20 branches around the city with a stock of hundreds of thousands of books and access to a wide range of learning and leisure activities..

The 160th birthday of Christchurch City Libraries is being celebrated with the exhibition *Illuminate: Unearthing Treasures from our Collection* which opens on Saturday at the Southbase Gallery, level 2 of Tūranga. It will run until 27 October.

The exhibition features very rare books, including *An Account of a Voyage Around the World*, by James Cook, published in 1773, original New Zealand art works, historic maps, vintage posters from the 1970s and 1980s including some printed by record label Flying Nun, and a typescript of *Catalogue of the Universe* by celebrated local author Margaret Mahy.

Christchurch City Libraries started out as a single room inside the Mechanics' Institute on High St in 1859. It had 100 subscribers. In 1876, the library became the property of Canterbury College, the forerunner to the University of Canterbury. By that time it had 3400 lending books.

In 1948 responsibility for the library was transferred to Christchurch City Council and in 1982 a Central Library building opened on Gloucester St with a stock of nearly 400,000 books and a membership of 90,000.

The new five-storey central library, Tūranga, opened in Cathedral Square in October 2018 offering a gallery, 3D printing, and a digital touch screen Discovery Wall along with 180,000 books. Council Head of Libraries Carolyn Robertson says the importance of libraries has grown hugely over the past 160 years.

"It's amazing to think that libraries have been serving local people for so long. In those early days books were all people could borrow, but today's libraries are a source of so much information across many different platforms, as well as being home to a huge range of programmes and events."

"Regardless of changes in technology, libraries have always been a place to inspire knowledge, foster creativity, challenge our curiosity and meet other people," she says.

"This anniversary is a great opportunity to celebrate that role. *Illuminate* is all about showing how libraries can open our eyes, and bring new information to light."

Library branches around the city will also mark the anniversary with displays of historic photographs and memorabilia.

Why....

Work on the cruise ship terminal is going to plan and it should be ready to welcome significant numbers of cruise ship passengers from October 2020. Estimates are that for each cruise ship that arrives at the terminal about a third of the passengers will go on pre-booked trips, a third will stay on the ships and the remaining third, including crew members, will choose to spend time in Christchurch or Lyttelton Harbour enjoying all that the area has to offer.

Conversations have begun about what we need to as a community to prepare for the impact of additional cruise ship visitors. Many questions have been raised including:

Are we ready for an influx of visitors?

What do we need to do to prepare for the significant number of visitors?

What will this mean for Lyttelton Harbour Businesses?

What will this mean for the community generally?

Are there opportunities for new businesses/entrepreneurial ideas to develop?

What are our ideas for promoting Lyttelton and the wider harbour as well?

The Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre and the Banks Peninsula Community Board would like to engage with the community in a conversation about how we can best prepare for the cruise ships and ensure that opportunities are realised and any words of caution listened to and addressed.

CONSTANT CYCLE OF CHANGE FAREWELL RITA



Rita Norris is fare welling Lyttelton Primary School after eight years as a welcome face to children and staff in the reception area. Originally starting at Lyttelton West Primary just after the earthquakes in 2011, Rita recalls her time working in this community fondly. She began at Lyttelton West when Andrew Barker was the Principal. "Since that time life in the Primary School has been a constant cycle of change", she said.

Rita has worked for three Principals in the eight years that she has been part of our community. "In that time it's been a real process of upheaval. Mergers on and off, multiple designs of a new school, a split school, and movement to a brand new school in 2016", she said. Despite all the change she's really enjoyed her time in Lyttelton, it's kept her motivated and enthusiastic.

In 2016 Rita moved from the former Lyttelton West School site to the new school at the former Lyttelton Main site.

'It's been quite an eye opener moving to such a different school environment to one we left behind. The Open Plan learning has been a journey for everyone. Some things that you think would work well don't and others that you weren't sure about have been really successful. The most interesting thing has been just how resilient the children have been. I think we often underestimate their abilities".

Naturally the highlight for Rita is watching the young people come and go and their progression. "It's wonderful to see them start school and develop. I share their highs and lows. You really are a part of their lives. It's so interesting". While we chat there is evidence of that, young people popping down for advice or just to tell her something.

Rita was originally from Lyttelton. Arriving in 1972 she went to school here, made lots of close friends, married her husband Andrew Norris at Holy Trinity later settling in Governors Bay. "You will still see me round and about Lyttelton as I return to visit friends and relatives. We also love being on the water and have a boat in port. I have such strong connections here".

She leaves the school just before the Art Auction. Her new role will be in the reception of the Emergency Department of Christchurch Hospital. All the best Rita, and thank you for your contribution to the lives of young people in the Lyttelton area.

We've also got a pretty spectacular range of eateries/wineries/artists and craftspeople/musicians and performers who hail from this area. We saw a gap in the event calendar, where there was no one festival celebrating and showcases all this as a region, which brought together everyone from Akaroa, through Pigeon Bay, Little River, Port Levy, Purau, Diamond Harbour, Governors Bay and Lyttelton under one event. So we thought we'd change that, and launch the Banks Peninsula Festival. At what better location than Orton Bradley Park!

Who are the people behind it and why ?

Emma Schiminski

Emma has worked in the hospitality and event industry for more than 20 years, both in New Zealand and overseas. She presently caters for the Pure Pods in Port Levy, and under her label Acheron has catered for a number of local weddings and events (including at Orton Bradley Park). Emma was a former

owner of the Rough Diamond café in Diamond Harbour, and has worked at Little River Café and Oddfellows in the city. She organised and hosted the Mystery Box Cook-off at this year's Little River Show, along with the Peninsula to Plate event, featuring Banks Peninsula lamb. Emma has excellent connections across the hospitality and music industries.

Jane is communications professional, and has worked as a journalist and PR consultant for the past 25 years in both New Zealand and the United Kingdom. She and her husband converted what was the Diamond Harbour Country Store into Chalfont Café, a licensed business they operated for three years before selling. Kate is our expert when it comes to processes and procedures, and is an administrative guru. Kate has also worked across health and safety in the construction sector, and has extensive experience of working in the hospitality sector and organising and hosting events. Kate is also a Banks Peninsula veteran and loves her home of 35 years, and can't wait to showcase what this amazing place and its people have to offer.

What will the event look like?

We're planning a relaxing day in a spectacular setting, enjoying the best of Banks Peninsula, including food, wines, beers, local produce, arts, crafts, local music and

performances. We're right on Christchurch's door, yet in many ways life on the Peninsula moves at its own pace and in its own delightful ways. Like many Peninsula folk, we're proud of our lifestyle and what we bring to the table. We've also teed up some awesome demonstrations of local talents, including the likes of a session on foraging on the Peninsula, cheese/pasta making, Kombucha making, distillation. We'll have sessions on throughout the day in our demonstration tent. Then, in recognition of the popularity of TV shows that see cooks take each other on in the kitchen, another attraction at this event is the Banks Peninsula Mystery Box Cook Off, where we provide three local talented chefs with local produce (the likes of lamb/crayfish/mussels/salmon and all manner of locally grown and foraged vegetables and condiments), and watch them prepare a winning dish. This event, organised by Emma Schiminski and Cam from Little River Café, was held at the Little River Show in January 2019. A great day was had by all, and it was touted as being the key attraction of this much-love A&P show. The three contestants from this first Cook Off will be returning to Banks Peninsula Festival 2020 as our judges.

Former old boy Jacob Chick was delighting in showing the children the art of photography. He explained all about digital versus film photography. "I have always loved photography so I made it my hobby. I enjoy discovering through learning".

In his workshop all of the students had never put a roll of film into a camera! Seemed like the teachers were the same! With digital photography, that seems to be a skill that has been lost. After further instruction Jacob's group went on a photography walk learning to take photos with manual cameras and mobile phones.

All the students were engrossed in whatever activity they chose to try. The variety of arts on offer was amazing. Some students learnt about Stop Motion Movies with Ari Nicholson, others learnt about observational native bird drawing with Jessie Rawcliffe. Caine Tauwhare demonstrated his wide range of skills, this time teaching Maori 'mask'making. Joe Bowen had the students engrossed with rope making and stone polishing. Kate McRae had a large audience captivated with the art of collage. The final class was with Kim Hennessey learning about charcoal drawing.

In all, a very successful, morning at the school, our children are indeed lucky to live in such a talented and giving community.

TE ANA MARINA WOOLSTORE INVESTOR ANNOUNCED

Deputy Mayor and Councillor for Banks Peninsula Ward Andrew Turner welcomed the announcement.

"This announcement represents further positive progress at Te Ana Marina. The community has been impressed with the development of the new facilities and the long awaited public waterfront access which Te Ana provides," said Mr Turner.

"This latest development, announced today, will lead to the opening of businesses which can only enhance the Te Ana experience for visitors and users. I look forward to seeing this area thrive as an excellent addition to Lyttelton's existing offering in a way that will attract more visitors to both Lyttelton and the Harbour," Andrew Turner says.

Richard Peebles sees The Woolstore as an exciting opportunity for a multi-use waterfront retail and hospitality development. "We have opportunities available for hospitality, small office and retail tenants with amazing marina views and waterfront location. Achieving a diverse tenant mix will make The Woolstore an all-day vibrant destination, which will become a popular spot for tourists, the Lyttelton residents and our local Christchurch visitors to gather and enjoy."

The Peebles Group's vision for The Woolstore includes small diverse retail activities, a local bar and restaurant, a gym which could have spin classes on the promenade, as well as small offices with unrivaled views.

"Our plans are being finalised and we are looking forward to engaging with prospective tenants over the coming weeks. We will be commencing building work very shortly," said Mr Peebles.

CHRISTCHURCH SURVEY SUPPORTS GREATER EFFORT ON CLIMATE CHANGE

People believe that everyone needs to do more to tackle climate change, a new survey shows.

Of the 2724 people who responded to the Christchurch City Council's May online survey on climate change, nearly 80 per cent view the issue as "extremely important".

Christchurch residents are also being asked to have their say on setting a city wide greenhouse gas emissions target as part of the Council's commitment to delivering a climate change strategy.

Feedback on the Council's emissions target for Christchurch closes on Wednesday, 14 August.

In the May survey, most people believe everyone should be doing more to address climate change.

Most people (77 per cent) feel that New Zealand businesses are not doing enough to address the issue. Most respondents also believe that Central Government (68 per cent) and the Council (61 per cent) need to do more to deal with climate change. People aged under 24 are most likely to see climate change as important while those aged over 50 are less likely to do so. However, the level of concern among older respondents remains high at 70 per cent.

Most people (84 per cent) believe that climate change will have a big impact on them personally.

Nearly 80 per cent agree that human actions are accelerating climate change.

Most people (84 per cent) believe Christchurch emission targets should be based on "robust science" while 57 per cent say they should be "achievable and realistic based on planned actions".

Most of the survey respondents (65 per cent) also feel that their actions make a difference when it comes to reducing climate change.

Council Head of Strategic Policy Emma Davis says the survey shows that Christchurch residents are interested in the issue of climate change and the need to take action.

"We are encouraging everyone to have their say on the

emissions target because it will help inform our climate change strategy,” she says.

At present, the Government’s Zero Carbon Bill sets the target of New Zealand having net zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2050, excluding methane.

The Council’s emissions target consultation seeks public views on whether Christchurch should set a more ambitious goal.

NAVAL POINT DEVELOPMENT OPTIONS FEEDBACK POURS IN



There’s been a fantastic response to our call for feedback from the public on Naval Point Development options.

The opportunity to provide feedback closed on Sunday 28 July, with more than 300 people, groups and organisations taking the time to submit their comments, and we thank all those who took part. Feedback will be made public once analysed, which is likely to take around four weeks due to the number and length of submissions received.

This is the first of two rounds of public consultation that are being done on the development of Naval Point. This initial round will help inform a Naval Point Development Plan, which the public will get to comment on through a second feedback round.

The Naval Point Development Plan, which will go into a lot more detail than these option plans, is hoped to be ready for public consultation mid 2020.

The two options featured in this round of consultation focus on site enhancement, improved accessibility and greater recreational safety – on and off the water. They were developed following discussions with key stakeholders, working with Te Hapū o Ngāti Wheke and considerable site research.

The aim is to make Naval Point a water focused public space providing access to Whakaraupō/Lyttelton Harbour for everyone to enjoy, while also improving existing onsite recreational assets.



PORT SADDLE PLANTING DAY

The Lyttelton Port Company is proud to work with the Banks Peninsula Conservation Trust (BPCT), Enviroschools groups and local residents to restore the 17 ha Port Saddle in Lyttelton.

The next public planting day will be held on Saturday September 14, a chance to plant native trees and learn about the unique ecology, flora and fauna of this special place.

LPC's Environment and Planning Manager Kim Kelleher says the partnership between the Port and the BPCT is focused on removing weeds and pests and restoring habitat through planting native trees, lovingly grown from locally collected seeds by DOC's Motukarara Conservation Nursery.

"We see the partnership between LPC and BPCT as incredibly important. Our aim is for the area to be used for ecological restoration, recreation and environmental education."

"We want people to feel like this area is part of their town."

BPCT Volunteer Coordinator Sophie Hartnell organises business and community groups throughout the year to work on the Port Saddle land, and she says the progress has been rewarding to see.

"It is always a really great day out for volunteers, who learn about the importance of restoring this land to native bush, and bringing tui and native fauna back to the area."

In 2009 and 2010, BPCT released 72 tui on Banks Peninsula. Recent monitoring suggests the population is growing and spreading. Tui were seen in Lyttelton for the first time in 40 years.

Tui are significant ecologically because they are important pollinators of many nectar producing flowering plant species, such as kowhai, flax, rata and fuchsia. Tui also disperse larger seeds from trees like kahikatea, matai and miro.

Sophie encourages anyone interested to register for the planting day.

"It is a great day out where you can make a meaningful difference to our local environment and work alongside other volunteers."

Lyttelton Port Company is a partner of the Whaka-Ora Healthy Harbour plan. The Port Saddle partnership fits with the plans vision of restoring the ecological and cultural health of Whakaraupō/Lyttelton Harbour as mahinga kai, for generations to come.


