Shackleton's Boat Journey

The greatest survival story of all time" was the way Sir Edmund Hillary described the heroic journey undertaken by Ernest Shackleton and his captain Frank Worsley (native of Akaroa) with four others from the crew of the wrecked ship *Endurance*.

The crossing involved sailing in a converted lifeboat - the *James Caird* only 7m long and with no keel across 1200km from Elephant Island to South Georgia. Sailing over the treacherous and feared southern oceans, dodging icebergs and manoeuvring through 5m waves.


Through the incredible navigational skills of Worsley, whom only got three fleeting glimpses of the sun during the 16 day journey, the crew of six managed somehow to land on the tiny island of South Georgia - on the southern uninhabited side of course, necessitating a horrendous alpine crossing over glaciers and steep mountainous terrain to reach the whaling station at Grytviken and relative safety.

Such was the global interest in polar exploration in the early 20th century, Shackleton and his men were lauded as heroes, inspiring others to try to emulate their achievement.

Of three attempts to try to do what Shackleton and his men had done have been launched, only one succeeded. British explorer Tim Jarvis, in 2013, in a faithfully built replica of the original *James Caird* renamed the *Alexandra Shackleton*, he completed the exact same journey. The team also used the same 1913 equipment, the same unpalatable food, compass and navigation aids as Shackleton and Worsley had access to. Tim's book *Shackleton's Epic* is a 'must read' to anyone interested in Antarctic exploits.

If anything Tim's feat reads as grippingly if not more so than the original, as like Shackleton, they struck atrocious conditions as soon as they set off from Elephant Island. They somehow survived the journey without capsizing. They then had various catastrophes beset them after arrival on South Georgia.

Tim has very generously agreed to make the *Alexandra Shackleton* available to the city of Christchurch, via The Christchurch Foundation, and The Foundation has agreed to locate the boat in Akaroa, believing this to be its spiritual home, given Worsley's childhood spent here, prior to using his peninsula-taught skills in the world's oceans.



The boat has already been shipped from its last home in Rhode Island USA and will be on display at two events that The Foundation is hosting. One in Christchurch, and one in Akaroa. Tim has graciously agreed to address the attendees with first-hand accounts of his incredible journey in the steps of Shackleton and Worsley.

There will be something quite magical about being able to see, and even touch, the very vessel in which six brave explorers conquered their demons and managed somehow to achieve the almost impossible.

For too long Frank Worsley has not received the proper recognition his feats deserved. He has also lived in the shadow of Shackleton to the extent that his name is not even mentioned sometimes in coverage of Shackleton's famous exploits. The truth is that none of the 26 survivors of the *Endurance* would have lived to tell their story had it not been for the heroic navigational efforts of Akaroa's Frank Worsley.

Join The Little Ship Club of Canterbury in Akaroa on Saturday 28th March to meet Tim and the Alexandra Shackleton in person. More details regarding tickets to this fantastic event will be published shortly.

With 60 plus stalls, Mystery Box Cook Off, a range of demonstrations and live music throughout the day, plus entertainment for the kids, there's something for everyone. Gate sales also available on the day, but entry will be limited, so to be sure you secure your ticket, book online today.



Tickets cost \$25 adult, \$5 12-17 years and under 12 years free. Under 18 years must be accompanied by a parent or guardian. A portion of every ticket sold goes to Orton Bradley Park, a privately run park.

Orton Bradley Park is located 25km from central Christchurch by car, or take the Black Cat Diamond Harbour Ferry from Lyttelton. Free buses will be running from Diamond Harbour Eatery, 5 minute walk from the ferry, to Orton Bradley Park, and will be returning to the ferry throughout the day.

Makers Space To Move In

They say good things take time. The Community Shed - Makers Space first came to life in 2018 and was gifted the name Te Puna Auaha Trust (meaning the spring/pool of creativity and innovation) by Te Hapū o Ngāti Wheke. Since its inception this great community idea has been slowly gathering supporters, equipment and ideas but a site has been the missing piece in the story. There have been a few potential suitable sections eyed up but early this February a lease agreement was signed with the Lyttelton Port Company. The former Post Office site on Norwich Quay will become the home of this creative working space.

Trustee's Rob Stent, Jacob Chick, Paul Dietsche, Julia Fenn, Jill Pears and Sarah Pritchett are brimming with excitement and possibilities, the lease has just been signed and they are eagerly waiting to get the keys. "This site is amazing", said Rob. "It's in an area that will be easily accessible to people in Lyttelton and Diamond Harbor.; it's large so there is plenty of space and it's in an area where tools and containers meld into the local environment".

"The space is going to be transformed into not just a standard "Menz Shed""", said Paul. "It's always been our intention that it be both for men and women of any age plus children". He envisages that people will be able to

come and use the equipment to make and repair things. "There will be spare tools available on site and into the future there will be the possibility of classes". First off it



looks like the Library of Tools and Things will relocate and spin out of Project Lyttelton into the Trust. "The Tool Library is such an obvious partner", he said. Paul is already an active participant in that particular project and was instrumental in getting the tool database up and running.

With the site secured the Trust can move into phase two. The Trust has been donated several containers and lots of workshop equipment (from Linwood College). The focus will now go on getting these approved and onto site and ensuring they are fitted out ready for purpose. "In order to get this side of the project going we are beginning a crowd funding campaign via Boost It, on February 28", said trustee Jacob Chick.

There are three parts to the funding campaign about to roll out. The first ask - \$5000 will be for moving the containers on site and getting power to each unit then after that an additional \$10,000 and \$20,000 will be sought to fit out the containers and surrounds for full site activation", he said.

It's terrific hearing all the locals who are involved with this project. "There is so much "young" local energy. Julia Villard, Jennifer Clarke and Sam Henderson are also involved. Everyone is just waiting to get going", said Paul.

Corporates are very keen to partner with this project. Orion is interested in the plastic recycling idea, the Port Company are keen to link its staff to the wider community and share the knowledge and skills that they have, Fulton Hogan, as part of its community outreach, have donated a container. Linwood High School donated lots of equipment surplus to requirements from the new school build. National Storage Hillsborough have been keeping the tools secure for us until the site is ready. "The support and generosity from businesses and community has been wonderful, we can't wait to get up and running!" says Julia Fenn. Trustee Jill Pears, the Principal of Diamond Harbour School, sees wonderful opportunities for young students to get some great hands on experience creating things very close to home.

"This will be a place that will empower people to do things themselves. I see great potential personally as well as for the community", said Jacob. Meanwhile he's busy getting the crowd funding campaign plus a website up and running. The intention is the site will be a community space seven days a week. Keep an eye for the funding raising programme. and other ways to get involved as the site develops through following our Social Media. Lyttelton Port's Environmental Manager Kim Kelleher said "LPC is thrilled we could help by providing a site so close to town and accessible for the local community. We're really looking forward to supporting Te Puna Auaha to become a wonderful asset for Lyttelton and harbour communities."

Our Top 10 Tips to get your Bin Right

Over the past week we've had some great questions come in about what you can put in your yellow wheelie bin. To help you bin good, we've put together a list of 10 handy tips.

Tip #1

Soft plastics – any plastic you can easily scrunch or bend in your hand, like plastic bags, cling film, courier bags, bubble wrap, chip packets, frozen food bags, biscuit trays, sushi trays, bread bags, chocolate bar wrappers and plastic ties – need to go in the red bin.

Tip #2

Bottle tops and lids of ANY kind should go in the red bin. They're made from a different material and if they are in the yellow bin they will contaminate the recycling.

Tip #3

Food-soiled cardboard and paper, such as pizza boxes, fish 'n' chip paper, burger bags and paper towels, should go in the green bin.

Tip #4

Hard plastic bottles and containers numbered 1 through to 7 can go in the yellow bin. However, they need to be bigger in size than an individual yoghurt pot but smaller than three litres to get through our automated sorting plant. Don't squash them or bag them up. Make sure you clean them and remove the lids.

Tip #5

Bags and packaging that are bio-degradable or compostable don't break-down within the 12 weeks it takes us to turn the contents of your green wheelie bin into compost so they need to be home composted or disposed of in the red bin.

Tip #6

Cartons that hold liquid or food – like juice, yoghurt, soy milk or milk cartons – can't be accepted for recycling. They need to go in the red bin.

Tip #7

Drink cans and metal tins are the only metal items that can go in your yellow bin. Remember to give them a quick rinse and make sure they are loose in the bin. Any other metal items might cause breakdowns in the machinery at our processing facility. If you want to get rid of metal tools, kitchen pots and pans, or household appliances you can drop them off for free at one of our three EcoDrop recycling centres where they can be reused at the Ecoshop or salvaged as scrap metal.

Tip #8

Polystyrene - whether it is in the shape of meat trays or packaging peanuts - needs to go in your red bin.

Tip #9

Clean cardboard and paper, including glossy paper, needs to be the size of an envelope or larger to go in the yellow bin. If it is smaller it can go in the green bin. If you can remove any packaging tape around the cardboard, we would appreciate it but it's not essential.

Tip #10

Any paper or cardboard that has a coating to waterproof it, like disposable coffee cups and till receipts, need to go in the red bin because they cannot be recycled.

Remember the wheelie bin app, which you can download from the App Store and Google Play, has great information on what can go in each of the bins.

Port Welfare Committee Lyttelton A First?

Former Community Board member John McLister began lobbying for the rights of foreign seafarers during his term on the Bank Peninsula Community Board 2016-2019. Now John is the vicar at St Saviours' at Holy Trinity and he continues the work to improve conditions for seafarers visiting the port as the chaplain at the Seafarers Centre.

Under the United Nations's Maritime Labour Convention (MLC), which New Zealand recently ratified, all ports are to have a 'Port Welfare Committee' to ensure seafarers are receiving the appropriate standard of care while in port (see sidebar).

"In New Zealand there are currently no Port Welfare Committees," says John. "This is a serious breach of an international human rights convention."

Port Welfare Committees are made of the various stakeholders in a port - the port authority, unions, shipping companies and agents. The committee's job is to regularly review seafarers' welfare facilities and services in a port.

In Lyttelton's case, John wants a community board member on the committee. "Our port is 100% owned by the Christchurch City Council," says John. "The welfare standards for foreign seafarers arriving in Lyttelton is something the Council should be protecting." The Community Board indicated strong support to the setting up of the committee.

"The Lyttelton community is fantastic in their support of seafarers arriving in the port, and Lyttelton has a long history in advocating for seafarers' rights." says John. "It seems appropriate that we should be the first place in New Zealand to establish a Port Welfare Committee."

The first meeting of the committee is scheduled for April.

Seafarers' shore-based rights under the Maritime Labour Convention 4.4:

- shore leave
- access to a seafarers' centre
- transportation to the seafarers' centre
- a technically competent person staffing the centre
- well-being and welfare support
- wi-fi access
- currency exchange at a fair rate
- ship visits from a seafarers' welfare worker
- a Port Welfare Committee to review welfare facilities and services
- public grants or levies on shipping to fund shore-based welfare

New Booking System for Squash

A new, exciting user-friendly booking system called Pay2Play will go live from 10am on 28th January 2020 for the Lyttelton Recreation Centre's squash court bookings!

If you have ever booked a Lime scooter it's just the same, giving you more time for playing with friends and whanau. You can book from home or your office via a cloud based system or manually at the front desk of the Lyttelton Recreation Centre between the hours of 10am -4pm weekdays and 10-1pm on Saturdays.

Step 1

If you are 18 years of age or over have your credit ready! Go to the Pay2Play website: www.pay2play.co.nz OR visit the front desk at the Lyttelton Recreation Centre (*between the hours of 10am -4pm weekdays and 10-1pm on Saturdays*).

Step 2

Follow the instructions to sign up and then select your booking. You can pay with Credit Card, Debit Card or Internet Banking (account2account). Read the hirer terms and conditions. Once you agree to the conditions you will receive an email confirming your booking with instructions and a door pin code.

Step 3

Arrive at the Centre for your booking. Enter your one off booking code on the Pay2Play key pad (the closest pin pad at the front entrance). Pick up the pre-use inspection sheet (inside the front door on the wall) and on departure leave the completed signed form. Court lights will turn on/off at the beginning and end of your booking. All other lights are manually controlled.

Raupo has been investigating our 180 year old treaty. Here is what we found out.

The treaty is an agreement between Maori and English. It was first signed on 6th February, 1840. It took place in Waitangi in Northland. It has three articles. The Maori chiefs weren't sure about the treaty to start with. There was much korero before the signing. English missionaries advised the chiefs. The third article promised citizenship and protection to the Maori people. The actual treaty is stored at the Wellington national library.



'Well, let's see,' said Paddy, 'he went to school with my Dad, who is 89 this year.'

'Wow, is he that old? Keeps himself pretty fit walking that huge dog of his,' George said.

The wagging tongues were active throughout the village by those with high moral standards. One thing they all agreed on was that the lady at the centre of this speculation was exceedingly good looking and Italian. Her 'Buongiorno and Grazie's' soon confirmed that. The lady's English was limited, but her accent only added to her allure. Hardly surprising that the local men all found her attractive.

Martin Sly looked across Lyttelton Harbour while drinking a special bitter blend of Italian coffee lovingly prepared by his houseguest. He recalled the time he had spent in Italy during the second world war, fighting the Hun. Dreadful times he would prefer to forget but when Sophia arrived the memories flooded back. He served in the second NZ Division, known affectionately as the 'Div.' Aged just 22, Martin fought in several battles in Italy. The bullet had hit his left shoulder, shattering flesh and bone, spinning him backwards. He awoke in extreme pain, while being stretched back behind lines, to the field hospital.

'How are you feeling today, Martin?' Sophia asked. 'Oh, much the same my dear, but I do feel I'm going downhill fast. Did you sleep well?' Yes, Grazie.' They smiled at each other, relaxed and content. Three months had passed since her arrival and the beginning of their bonding; with many long discussions into the night about the implications of the past. Remembering the bombed hospital, he survived only because in the confusion, an Italian woman risked death to rescue him. Mia was a nurse, who gradually brought him back to life and vigour. Maybe a little too much vigour, because she fell pregnant to Martin. Polish troops were the first to reach them. Martin was transferred to the Red Cross. Mia was absent, foraging for food. He never saw her again.

Over the years Martin spent countless hours writing letters to Italian mayors and city officials, but without success. Europe was in turmoil after the war. Millions of stateless refugees roamed homeless across the continent. Restrictions were in place making it impossible for him to

travel. They say that time heals, but not with Martin, he dreamt of her for years. Then one day he received a letter from the Italian embassy in Wellington; informing him he was the subject of a search.

Martin was overcome with emotion and replied immediately. The lady in question turned out to be Sophia, his deceased lover's granddaughter. As Martin had never married, he decided to leave his home and possessions to her, but she staunchly refused. Finally, he persuaded her to accept. She went home promising to return in the summer. Unfortunately, it was only to attend Martin's funeral.

The day was overcast, in keeping with the mood of RSA members, who came to honour their comrade in arms. The padre from Burnham military camp conducted the service telling those present that NZ lost one in every 150 of its small population, standing at just 1.6 million people, in WW2. Sophia, dressed entirely in black complete with veil, stood apart from the other mourners. She was straight-faced, showing no outward signs of grief. When the time came to leave, she stepped forward and threw a handful of earth onto the coffin together with a sealed letter, written to Martin some years before, by her grandmother.

Martin

You left me with child when I most needed you. I have been ostracised for bearing your daughter, despised and shunned. But I bore the constant insults certain that one day you would return. I never lost hope. Now I am ready to pass on into the afterlife and the arms of our Reverend Holy Mother. Our union produced a wonderful and talented pharmacist, specialising in dangerous drugs. I explained to her who her birth father was, and the unusual circumstances involved. She too longed for you to appear and claim her. Finally, I moved to Roma and married a kind gentleman from there. Sophia, your lovely granddaughter, knows our story and has promised to set matters right, once I have passed over.

May you burn in the flames of eternal hell,



Linen Cottage Elena Chomic

7 February – 1 March 2020

Linen garments and leather accessories handcrafted by Lithuanian-born Elena Chomic will be on display at Stoddart Cottage Gallery throughout February.

Linen, leather, wood and wool are common materials for folk art and craft in Lithuania and there is a long and strong tradition of using locally produced linen textiles for clothing and household furnishing. Colours from nature such as warmly glowing amber, ochre clay, forest greens and sea blues are preferred for daily life, even the brighter blue of linen flax flowers.



In this solo exhibition Elena Chomic continues these traditions with original design and contemporary style.

Elena was born and grew up near the Baltic Sea. At school she was taught how to work with linen textiles, to weave and embroider, and to make objects from leather and wood. She has continued to work with these materials throughout her life.

"It's been 6 years since I arrived in New Zealand and today it sometimes seems to me that I was born here." says Elena. "I'm surrounded by my favourite colours, only brighter, and I can easily imagine that if our Earth could be pierced right through the centre of the globe, like a needle pierces fabric, I'd fall all the way through straight to Lithuania, but upside down!" she laughs.


