Whaka-Ora Healthy Harbour team set sights on future

Rāpaki Marae was the setting for the inaugural Whaka-Ora Healthy Harbour programme noho marae recently. Executives from Lyttelton Port Company (LPC), Ngāi Tahu, Christchurch City Council (CCC) and Environment Canterbury attended the two-day visit to strengthen the organisations' commitment to working collaboratively on the programme's delivery.

The kaupapa/purpose of the plan is to restore the ecological and cultural health of Whakaraupō/Lyttelton Harbour as mahinga kai. After a pōwhiri from the mana whenua, Ngāti Wheke, it was time for kai and mihi (greetings).

Newly-appointed LPC chief executive officer Roger Gray, along with our chief executive Bill Bayfield (pictured above) and CCC chief executive Dawn Baxendale spoke about their organisation's ongoing commitment to Whakaraupō/Lyttelton Harbour and the Healthy Harbour programme.

Many discussions and proposals were tabled over the course of the stay, with a few common themes emerging. Some of the key themes discussed were around removing barriers so that practical actions could take place; the use of regulatory instruments in decision making; behaviour changes being a key for all groups involved – including community; and how those communities could build capacity and capability.

Our zone delivery lead for Banks Peninsula, Gillian Jenkins, said the noho marae experience was vital to the success of the programme.

"Bringing together the partners of the plan on the marae helps us to all break down some of the invisible barriers that can exist when we are all in our own offices," she said.

"We openly get to share some of the successes and opportunities the plan brings and ensure we are all working together to make it come to life."

Gillian added: "It's a great opportunity to see and hear what the plan means to the rūnanga and working with the view of the harbour right outside really keeps the goals in perspective."

Aligning and ongoing monitoring of data was also discussed. It was decided that data is key to telling the whole story of the Whaka-Ora journey.

The next step for the programme is for proposed actions and goals to be presented to the Governance Group this month, for consideration on how best to achieve them.

The noho marae aligns with the Plan's kaupapa of mahinga kai as the group was able to spend invaluable time in the environment they are tasked with protecting, along with discussing and carrying out actions towards the kaupapa.

Lyttelton is such a wonderful place that we should all be rightly proud of - its changing face is part of what




ECAN Issues

Vicky Southworth Our Councillor

Vicky Southworth is one of two ECAN Councillors elected to represent your interests at Environment Canterbury. She is well qualified to represent our area being a geologist with a Master of Water Resource Management from the University of Canterbury, and a long-time supporter of environmental improvement. She's also very local living just around the corner in Sumner.

Vicky is keen to get out and about and connect with her constituents and to enable that to happen in the Lyttelton area we have invited Vicky to contribute to the Lyttelton Review from time to time. She enthusiastically responded to this opportunity. It's very clear she's going to be a great

champion for public transport. "I use the purple bus all the time and, although I am aware that it is one of the best services in the city, I also know it could be improved to make it even more customer friendly," she said.

Meeting up now is very opportune. "Its perfect timing to let me know the Environment Canterbury issues that are really important to you. We are currently engaging with the public on our Annual Plan. We need to know your priorities. For instance, if you want a significantly different public transport network we need to hear that now so that we can get the resources to make this happen. I really encourage you to have your say. Visit the Environment Canterbury web site www.haveyoursay.ecan.govt.nz/betterfuture or speak to me in person", she said.

Prior to speaking with Vicky a couple of locals had some questions for her. These are addressed in a Q&A format.

Public Transport

I would be interested in the opportunities for public transport over the next few years - not just the ideas about how things could be improved, although that's important, but also the process around making changes. I would also be interested in her thoughts about central government's transport infrastructure investment for Christchurch (or lack of) in the last budget and how Environment Canterbury is responding to that.

Opportunities

In 2017 fifty-three percent of the city's carbon emissions came from transport. Currently Christchurch residents average little more than one return bus journey per month. It's really important that we create a public transport system that enables as many people as possible to leave their cars behind to reduce fossil fuel emissions. For people who can't drive or don't have access to a car the bus service can be critical, providing transport to school, to the supermarket, the library or friends in other suburbs. Whilst some services are reasonable, many need major improvements to attract people out of their car as well as meeting community needs.

Challenges:

The challenge is that significant improvement requires investment. Public transport is paid for by bus fares (37%), targeted rates (31%) and government grants (32%). I am comfortable considering buses as a public service since you will benefit whether you catch the bus or not through reduced congestion (time is money), and, longer term, less damaging (and costly) climate change impacts. At present, a shortage of investment together with the challenge of rebuilding a bus service in a 'quake damaged city, has resulted in a system that doesn't meet most people's needs. That means buses are seen as an expensive and irrelevant service by



many. It would be great to see more Central Government funding for public transport, and Environment Canterbury will advocate for that together with councillors from across Greater Christchurch. There's a determination to make sure we get a fair share of government funding available for public transport improvements to make our public transport work well for our communities.

Lyttelton doesn't have very good public transport. Can we get service frequency like Sumner?

I would love to see that happen. I know that frequency of service is important in making the service viable for people. It would also be great to be able to travel around the bays by bus, perhaps even connecting to Sumner. As a Sumner resident that would suit me really well! For public transport routes to be sustainable though there needs to be sufficient demand and ongoing support of those services, but it's a chicken and egg situation.

Would you consider a better bus service to Eastgate, Tannery, Woolston etc? Our current service just doesn't work.

If there is sufficient community demand for this to be sustainable, as with other suggestions, I would happily take this up and champion it. Please put your thoughts into feedback on this year's draft Annual Plan, which provides useful information for councillors as we begin to look towards the next Long-Term Plan. You can also contact me directly.

Often cyclists can't get through the tunnel because there is no room for their bikes on the bus (I have seen this on buses in both directions). Can there be a bookable shuttle service so people don't miss out at peak times?

All buses on the 28 route have three-tier external bike racks, and all the new buses will too. I wonder if there would still be over-demand if buses were more frequent around commuter peak times. A bookable shuttle is not something that the public transport system is able to provide, but it would be interesting to explore other ideas.

I am concerned that consents can be limited consents as they are considered not to affect many people/residents. In a place like Lyttelton, it is not always obvious who the affected parties are.

This is a difficult question to answer as it is really dependent on the application. The government is currently reviewing the Resource Management Act. A recent consultation document asked how public participation could be improved without overloading the system by consulting on every minor application. Check www.mfe.govt.nz to find out more and to input into subsequent consultations. It is really important for people to be able to have their say on proposals that affect them and early engagement can result in a better outcome for all.

Lyttelton air: Are there any plans to bring Lyttelton into the same Clean Air zone as Christchurch? We get quite a bit of smog from shipping and wood burners.

A 2016 study in Lyttelton showed traffic, shipping and port activity is not creating pollution that exceed standards set through national and regional public consultation. In terms of emissions from wood burners, there are already

rules around home heating for Lyttelton. If your home is not warm and dry in winter, or you need to upgrade your wood burner, contact Community Energy Action (funded by ECan, CCC, EECA and Rata Foundation) for information and assistance. For example, people can choose to install ultra-low emission burners now, using support available through Community Energy Action. We also offer a scheme whereby you can borrow money to put in new home heating and pay it back via your rates over nine years – called Healthier Homes Canterbury.

Protection of areas of significant flora/fauna: how to identify these areas and protect them from development e.g. small areas of remnant bush on private land.... it's pretty much about preserving what's left of our biodiversity

This is really important in the face of the huge biodiversity losses that we've seen. Central Government creates the rules around this and is currently consulting on a new National Policy Statement for Biodiversity. Submissions are/were due by 14 March. Identifying Significant Natural Areas (SNAs) will be the responsibility of city and district councils, but Environment Canterbury has expertise in this area and will offer support.

Where are Environment Canterbury's efforts in water management going to be focused in the coming years?

In the immediate locality the Whaka-Ora Healthy Harbour plan provides a really good guide to restoring the harbour's ecological and cultural values. This award-winning plan sets out really clearly the actions that need to take place and what outcomes can be achieved if everyone works together. The plan is available online or in the local library and is well worth a read (www.healthyharbour.org.nz). Water is central to the plan. Sediment transported from rural and urban land surfaces, for example, is a particular problem. It was developed with Environment Canterbury, local iwi, Christchurch City Council, Lyttelton Port Company and the local community.

No government agency seems to be taking the lead on Fire Risk. Could ECAN take the lead on this issue via its Civil Defence Role?

That's a very interesting question. I am on a committee that deals with hazards and resilience and I would be very happy to follow up on this suggestion. For context, Fire and Emergency New Zealand (FENZ) is the lead agency for reducing fire risk and responding to fire related emergencies. Information about how to reduce the risk of fire in our communities can be found on their website - <https://fireandemergency.nz/at-home/>. FENZ are also in the process of establishing Local Area Committees throughout the country. These committees could provide an important avenue for communities to raise their concerns regarding the management of fire risk in particular areas.

Kate Owen Touring

On 13 March 2020, Lyttelton musician Kate Owen (previously Kate Anastasiou) releases her debut album 'Not A Proper Girl' via Owen's own label Spin Stir Records. The album release will be accompanied by a tour of New Zealand's main centres Dunedin, Christchurch, Wellington and Auckland from 14 March 2020.

A singer with a poetic, restrained intensity, Owen has been song-writing for twenty years and performing live for over a decade.

'Not A Proper Girl', recorded with Ben Edwards (The Sitting Room, Lyttelton), showcases Owen's songs with rich textures including synth and strings, and strong rhythmic pulses from live kits and drums machines. The result is an album with a sound that has been likened to PJ Harvey and Julee Cruise (Twin Peaks), with a lyrical style echoing Jeff Buckley.

Themes of isolation and grief run strong throughout the album. Song writing is how Kate has worked through life's struggles; not feeling feminine enough as a young woman; losing her mother to mental illness and then suicide; never having children of her own; and in her own words her 'disillusionment with romantic love as the modern holy grail of human connection'

Owen's third single 'The Void' is being released 21 February the week following the album and tour announcement. 'The Void' is a bold drum driven track setting Jonty O'Connor (ZANE2000) loose to rage on the drum kit, while multi-layered guitars pedal and distort a creating steady driving cacophony. "The Void' explores the inevitability of madness and the human desire to seek comfort in others during terrifying times." Owen explains.

Owen is joined on her 'Not A Proper Girl' album release tour by her band Moses Robbins (guitar), Thomas Isbister (drums) and Kurt Preston (bass).

'Not A Proper Girl' is distributed by Southbound. All tracks will be available on Apple Music, Spotify and other major streaming platforms. Other artists featuring on the album include Jonty O'Connor (ZANE 2000, Shifting Sands, Emily Fairlight), Shane Bollingford, Tom Harris, Moses Robbins (House of Mountain, Jed Parsons), Anita Clark (Motte, Devilish Mary), Elmore Jones, Ben Edwards, and Mike Fordham. All tracks are written by Kate Owen.

ECAN'S Vessel Emissions

Your Questions Answered.

Environment Canterbury has recently received several enquiries about atmospheric emissions from vessels in Akaroa and Lyttelton Harbours, including from the Banks Peninsula Community Board. With this sort of community-wide interest, we want to share all relevant information, including the rules and practices in use, with as many people as possible.

What are the current rules?

As a regional council, we are not in a position to set the law that controls atmospheric discharges from vessels – it is for central government to do that. In fact, the government has announced plans to introduce regulations for the prevention of air pollution from vessels by late 2021. The proposed legislation is based on international regulations (MARPOL Annex VI) that already apply to most foreign vessels that visit New Zealand.

Compliance with MARPOL Annex VI is achieved by using low-sulphur fuel or fitting an exhaust cleaning system known as a 'scrubber' to reduce emissions to a level equivalent to those from low-sulphur fuel.

Vessels visiting Canterbury are generally flagged to countries where Annex VI applies. This means that these vessels are either burning a low-sulphur fuel or using scrubbers when visiting Akaroa or other areas. We have issued guidance to vessels to help them to ensure they comply with all legislation regarding both emissions and discharges. A copy of that advice is available on the Environment Canterbury website (www.ecan.govt.nz/do-it-online/harbourmasters-office/commercial-shipping/cruise-ships).

What role do scrubbers play?

Broadly, there are two types of exhaust scrubber:

- Closed-loop scrubbers: these use a closed system that retains all wash water and contaminants onboard the vessel for proper disposal ashore at approved facilities.

- Open-loop scrubbers: these use a system that discharges wash water to sea, which may have a secondary system to remove contaminants from discharged wash water.

The use of scrubbers does not mean there will be no visible emissions from a vessel; scrubbers remove some – but not all – contaminants. The mechanism used by scrubbers to remove contaminants may include the use of water droplets being sprayed into the exhaust gas. This helps remove the contaminants, but also produces steam which may be visible when it exits from a vessel's funnel along with exhaust.

Some open-loop scrubbers remove contaminants from the exhaust and then discharge the contaminants to sea. Again, while regional councils are not able to enact laws preventing this type of discharge while the vessel is moving, we do inform operators that our communities expect vessels to use a system that removes contaminants from any discharge to sea. In addition, where a vessel is at anchor or in a port, the use of open-loop scrubbers is not permitted.

Is air quality a problem in Akaroa or Lyttelton?

Finally, a note of reassurance; we have conducted detailed studies of air quality at Lyttelton and found that it is comfortably within World Health Organisation and national guidelines – despite significantly greater shipping, rail and road traffic than is the case in Akaroa. Given this, we can also be confident there are no issues in Akaroa related to air quality from vessels.

Council Survey Results Communities and Neighbourhoods

Banks Peninsula residents love where they live.

95% of Banks Peninsula residents who responded said they enjoy living in their Neighbourhood.

Residents were asked at the end of last year to fill out a short online survey about what they like and dislike about where they live, as part of the Christchurch City Council's ongoing Life in Christchurch survey programme.

The main reasons given for why they like their neighbourhoods were because of the natural environment (77%), sense of community (68%) and feeling at home (43%).

96% of Banks Peninsula residents feel safe walking in their neighbourhood during the day, while 86% feel safe walking alone in their neighbourhood after dark.

The survey did highlight some areas for improvement, with 68% of respondents satisfied or very satisfied with the range of recreation, shopping and socialising opportunities in their neighbourhoods – lower than the 71% for all respondents city-wide.

In addition to asking people questions about their neighbourhood and their connections to their community, the survey also delved into accessibility issues and whether people have experienced, or witnessed discrimination.

10% of Banks Peninsula respondents said they had been discriminated against in the last 12 months – half of these saying it happened at work and a quarter said it was because of their race or ethnic group.

Coronavirus (COVID-19) Advice for public events and mass gatherings

If you have ever booked a Lime scooter it's just the same, giving you more time for playing with friends and whanau. You can book from home or your office via a cloud based system or manually at the front desk of the Lyttelton Recreation Centre between the hours of 10am -4pm weekdays and 10-1pm on Saturdays.

Step 1

If you are 18 years of age or over have your credit ready! Go to the Pay2Play website: www.pay2play.co.nz OR visit the front desk at the Lyttelton Recreation Centre (*between the hours of 10am -4pm weekdays and 10-1pm on Saturdays*).

Step 2

Follow the instructions to sign up and then select your booking. You can pay with Credit Card, Debit Card or Internet Banking (account2account). Read the hirer terms and conditions. Once you agree to the conditions you will

receive an email confirming your booking with instructions and a door pin code.

Step 3

Arrive at the Centre for your booking. Enter your one off booking code on the Pay2Play key pad (the closest pin pad at the front entrance). Pick up the pre-use inspection sheet (inside the front door on the wall) and on departure leave the completed signed form. Court lights will turn on/off at the beginning and end of your booking. All other lights are manually controlled.

Draft Annual Plan 2020-2021

The Draft Annual Plan 2020-21 – our draft budget for the coming year – focuses on the need to secure the city's water supply and upgrade roads, footpaths and facilities. It also prioritises keeping rates as low as possible.

Open for feedback: 24th February 2020 - 2nd April 2020

This year Christchurch City Council is largely tracking as expected when it comes to our spending, revenue and borrowing.

The average proposed rates increase for a typical household is 2.74%.

We've been able to hold the rate increases to all ratepayers, including businesses, remote rural and residential, to 4.65% – less than 5% indicated in the 2018-28 Long Term Plan – without affecting services.

You can find more information about the changes in the draft Annual Plan consultation document [PDF, 5.8 MB], but here's a summary of our main proposals:

The average proposed increase for a typical household is 2.74 per cent.

Overall average rates increases are 4.65 per cent. We expect future rate increases to be in line with, or lower than what's in the LTP.

\$512.4 million operational spend. \$15.9 million more than what's in the LTP. This is spending on day-to-day services the Council provides.

\$512.0 million capital spend invested into the city. \$2 million more than what's in the LTP. This is spending on the construction of facilities and infrastructure.

Borrowing for the capital programme is \$68.8 million less than planned.

Amy soon realised she had heaps to learn on the job. One routine task was attending school times, overseeing the children's safety crossing teams and monitoring traffic behaviour. She was appalled by the number of drivers who ignored the school time flashing sign of 40 kph. Bernie, operating the camera, clocked twelve drivers exceeding the speed restrictions. In sixteen sleeps from today I will celebrate my arrival


