Album Release "Hope and Wire" Out March 5th

Yes it is short notice, but this coming Friday 2nd March and Saturday 3rd March The Eastern will be playing live at the Lyttelton Top Club, celebrating their album release Hope and Wire. Also supported by Lindon Puffin and Marlon Williams this is a live event not to be missed.

The Eastern are a string band that roars like a punk band; swings like a gospel band; drinks like a country band; works like a bar band; hopes like folk singers; sings love songs like union songs; writes union songs like love songs; wants to slow dance and stand on tables - all at the same time!

March 2012 see's the release of Lyttelton's own The Eastern's third long player. Entitled 'Hope and Wire' it's a double album with twenty new songs on it. Folly probably, but also ambitious in the Eastern's own quietly industrious way. Recorded in the now ghostly suburb of Dallington post quake, in a red zoned house left by the family who owned it for thirty years, the record is informed by all the wonderful neighbours and strangers they have meet in the past very trying year.

The Eastern are a contrary mob, so in a time where the album concept is choking and spluttering and rapidly becoming less and less relevant, they said 'Bugger it, double the disc!' Defiantly a group who will always back the slowest horse, but to paraphrase the late Willie Dixon they're built for comfort never speed. That said though their work ethic remains their proudest achievement, two albums, three e.p.'s and close to two hundred shows a year, every year, in every corner of these

isles they remain committed to meeting and sharing beers and stories with old and new friends wherever they land.

They have toured with Steve Earle, the Old Crow Medicine Show and opened for lots of talented folks from Fleetwood Mac to Jimmy Barnes to Upper Hutt Posse, Trinity Roots and The Warratahs. With over fifty dates booked in NZ and Australia over the next two and half months and the understanding the band will be on tour all year this looks like it shall be The Eastern's most adventurous year yet.

Hope and Wire is out in all good community record stores and online from March 5th. It's released by rough peel records and distributed by the always kind 'Rhythymethod' distribution. The Eastern will be on tour forever.

John Key Visits Lyttelton

It's Not Everyday You Meet The Prime Minister

Lyttelton has certainly had a week in front of the camera. Starting on Monday night last week with TV3 Campbell Live in Lyttelton, for which a wonderful number of Lyttelton residents came down to the Petanque Court and enjoyed the hospitality of the Lyttelton Volunteer Fire Brigade sausage sizzle, live music and entertainment - not to mention the claim to fame of being on national television. Then on Thursday John Key and his team were in Lyttelton to visit our township one year to the date that he visited after the February 2011 earthquake. The visit this time was to catch up with community and business groups and to see how things have been progressing during the last year. John Key began his visit at Project Lyttelton where Margaret Jefferies and the team were able to talk about their focus on community building initiatives. From Project Lyttelton the group walked down London Street taking the time to chat to people on the street and visit local businesses - including the opportunity to pull a pint of beer at the Porthole Bar.

Before lunch time, the Prime Minister and his group headed to the temporary port-a-com of the Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre. To greet him was Wendy Everingham, Ann Jolliffe [a board member of the Information Centre] Bettina Evans representing the Lyttelton Time bank, Wendy McKay and Christine Wilson from Lyttelton Community House and Liz Briggs [a volunteer from the Information Centre]. Each of the community groups explained their role in Lyttelton and talked about the most pressing community needs: finance to assist the recovery process; a new community meeting place on the Petanque Club; and how the government could support Lyttelton. Liz Briggs quizzed him about possible funding sources, and John Key encouraged the group to apply to the Prime Ministers Fund. Before the Prime Minister left, the Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre highlighted how much Lyttelton needed help to get tourism moving again, and a copy of the Destination Lyttelton marketing proposal plus several copies of the Lyttelton Review was given to him.

In a show of appreciation of the Prime Ministers time, John Key was presented with a variety of gifts from each of the community groups and the Lyttelton Time bank presented him with a beautiful copy of Lyttelton's earthquake stories



compiled by Bettina Evans. This book will be available to the general public within the next week or so, but Mr Key is the first person in New Zealand to have this special book. He and his wife were also presented with Lyttelton's special earthquake hearts. The visit then progressed to Freeman's where a large contingent from the Lyttelton Harbour Business Association and other invited guests enjoyed lunch, and talked about issues relevant to the re-building of Lyttelton. There is no doubt that the Prime Minister was very generous with his time in Lyttelton and many appreciated the opportunity to highlight their projects and issues.

Homes Are Selling Post Quake

Let's talk about residential real estate. Our home is most likely to be our greatest asset, so it is no wonder that real estate is a topic frequently discussed. Since the dawn of the new millennium there is no denying Lyttelton has responded to market influences and price pressures that are evident across most of New Zealand. At the close of 2000 the average residential dwelling value in Lyttelton was position around \$165,000. By the close of 2010 that figure had risen to \$403,000 representing a growth spurt of more than 144 percent spanning the decade; delivering an unprecedented property boom for Lyttelton home owners; and leaving many with the realisation that such growth levels could never be expected to last.

Toward the end of the last decade the spread of global economic gloom descended on real estate New Zealand wide and in Lyttelton [as with Canterbury] the effects of the September, February and ongoing seismic activity has delivered a dampening effect on the local real estate market. At the height of the decade ninety six residential homes changed owners in one year, reaching a record high averaged sale price of \$419,000 or a combined total residential dwelling value exceeding \$40million dollars. Amongst the seismic activity last year, thirty five residential properties still changed ownership, with a combined value exceeding \$12.9 million dollars. The lowest residential house value recorded was \$130,000, while the highest value achieved for a residential dwelling was recorded at \$760,000; representing the complex diversity of residential real estate in Lyttelton.



Ray White licensed real estate salesperson, and Lyttelton resident, Mike Shine was the salesperson responsible for the highest sales value achieved last year. Mike says selling real estate today is all about the method, and not the market, "as success comes from good preparation and effective marketing". Mike believes he achieves the best result when he is working with people who understand the importance of well presented homes and effective marketing campaigns. "In this post earthquake environment sales are not about photos in a window and keeping your fingers crossed. It is about credible well researched and well presented effective marketing material that identifies buyer's needs. Motivation is critical, as is the choice of media to get the message out" he says.



Professionals licensed real estate agent, and local resident, Lynnette Baird further comments "expect to see the odd surprise result. For the most part, buyers today understand earthquake damage to property, but there are some who have simply reached their limit in terms of the inconvenience of living in a damaged home, or continually having to relocate. These buyers are willing to spend whatever it takes to reclaim normality." Lynnette also acknowledges the compounding effect of pressure being placed on the real estate market through the Government buy out of homes in the Red Zones. Lynnette says that "with more than six thousand cash in hand buyers entering the property market this year, the flow on effects of increasing prices and shorter selling periods are fast becoming evident across the south, west or north regions of Christchurch."

Here at the Lyttelton Review we believe it is just a matter of time before people rediscover the benefits of living in Lyttelton. Having spoken to the experts, it is clear to see that homes are still selling through these seismic times, and are continuing to sell for agreeable market prices. If you are thinking of selling your Lyttelton home this coming year, talk to one of the local real estate agents or salespeople to talk through what the best option is for you.

Film Star Emily Blunt Lends A Name

A quick update has been received from The Loons to let everyone know what they have been doing since the Christchurch season of "Hanussen - the Palace of Burlesque". Mike has just announced that Emily Blunt [British actress of movie and stage and most famously starring in 'The Devil Wears Prada') is now the patron of the Loons Circus Theatre Company.

Film star Emily Blunt has lent her support to the Loons fundraising campaign for the rebuilding project where it is hoped The Loons will be able to raise \$600,000 for the new theatre. In a statement released from Los Angeles Blunt said "what a complete nightmare. I am so sorry your lovely community was shattered with the quake. I would be happy to help by lending my name".

As we all know, The Loons theatre survived the December and February earthquakes last year, but was badly damaged in the June quake. Loons artistic director Mike Friend has been quoted as saying \$400,000 had already been raised for the repair and strengthening work, but a further \$200,000 was needed for the refit.

Fundraising has already attracted \$250,000 from the Mayoralty Fund; \$85,000 from the Todd Foundation; and \$65,000 from the earthquake fund administered by the prime minister.

Friend said he was thrilled Emily Blunt had agreed to become the theatre's patron. He taught Blunt for two years at a British drama school and also worked with her on a production at the Edinburgh Festival in 1999. "This is great news. It is good for all of us. It is good for the theatre company and the Loons and for Lyttelton," Friend said. The new Loons will be a "community arts centre" with a bar in the basement of the building. "We want to open on September 7th as that is when the performers are coming back."

Diamond Harbour and Districts Historical Association

Graham has been involved with a number of restoration projects in NZ and the UK where he has been part of fund raising campaigns to raise money for the restoration work. One of his favourite cathedrals is Gloucester. Another interesting one is the Liverpool Metropolitan, a catholic cathedral started in the 1920s and designed by a Methodist to rival St Peters in Rome. Out of respect it was to be 1 metre shorter. During World War II work was suspended and after the war there was less money so it had to be build to suit the purse. It is still a large building, seating 3000 people. In the 1990s the roof needed replacement. I am sure that Graham will also talk about our cathedral and churches and how they could be restored.

At this meeting our new programme will be available. As it is not finalised there is still an opportunity to make suggestions of possible speakers or venues to visit for our field trip in November. But please let me have your suggestions as soon as possible and before our March meeting.

Maritime History of Boats in New Zealand

Designed or Built by Collings & Bell

This week the Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre received an inquiry from Ron Wattam, a Rotorua resident, looking to gather more information on New Zealand's maritime history through the boats designed and or built by the company Collings & Bell. It is understood that Ron's family are directly related to the great firm of Collings & Bell through his wife's grandfather and uncle, and that Ron would desperately like to receive some help in collating a list of all the boats that are:

A] Known by name to have been built or designed and are now history; or

B] Boats that are still operating in the waters around New Zealand and maybe some overseas and their names, sizes; or C] Boats that are just simply designed and then built by others.

Ron's research has discovered at least 50 different boats and he recognises that there must be a great deal more yet to be discovered. Ron believes "this should be considered a worthwhile project and be kept for History sake as there are many famous boats still operating around the many harbours and lakes in New Zealand at over 100 years old. Collings & Bell were in St Mary's Bay designing and building boats for over 60 years. These boats go from Runabouts, Yachts, Launches all sizes, Tugs, Barges, Fishing Boats and Ferries".

If you have any information, Ron would like to obtain current owners names, name and details of the boats, size of boat and an image as well a brief history would be must appreciated. All information will be followed up on. A copy of Ron's completed article will be presented to the Maritime Museum and hopefully some assistance in publication would be helpful and made available to all registered boat owners.
