Meet Lyttelton's Honorary Polish Consul

Have you ever walked past the Independent Provedoring Company on Norwich Quay and wondered who resides in the renovated grey office?

Formerly the historic offices of “The Star” newspaper and tucked beside the lovely wrought iron gate you will find the office of Winsome Dormer who has been operating this Lyttelton business for the past twenty three years. Winsome is an inspirational business and community leader and whilst she does not live in Lyttelton she has a real soft spot for the place.


Considering the events of the past eighteen months, our conversation weaves around some quick wins for the Lyttelton Township to help it look even more colourful and vibrant in its recovery phase. Winsome feels “we need to be using all those flag poles around the township. Let's celebrate the nationalities of the crews that are in port at a particular time. Maybe its India in September, the Philippine's in October”. Winsome feels bright flags could really lift the township and make the port even more welcoming for our foreign visitors. Perhaps the Time Ball flagpole could be reinstated. It holds such a prominent position and with flag poles at Sutton Reserve; the Port Company site and Winsome's site on Norwich Quay, plus others, could really make a difference for a small outlay. Winsome backs up this comment by saying “this could be another project when business and community could work together. I would be happy to donate some flags to kick start this initiative. Other colourful ideas include bunting, sowing wildflowers in empty sites or more gorilla artworks. Colour will give us all a lift and enhance our iron, steel and industrial look”.

Currently Winsome flies two flags, the New Zealand and Polish flags. The New Zealand one requires no explanation however the Polish one is another story. It transpires that Winsome has recently been made the honorary Consul of Poland for the South Island. Her connections to Poland date back to the 1990's, when Polish fishing vessels used to be in port and her company dealt with the Dalmor Company. At that time her company was involved in selling the first shipment of New Zealand wine to Poland! So what does this role entail? She will be helping to facilitate trade between the New Zealand and Poland; and building relationships to facilitate cultural exchanges. Naturally some of her work will be involved with yachts and shipping. Winsome is contemplating the possibility of a sister port relationship with the Polish Port of Gdansk. She also has some interesting links down south in Dunedin. A Polish Heritage of Otago and Southland Charitable Trust operates down there and she is helping to support their work. Polish immigrants came on the first European ships to Dunedin [Joseph Conrad's SS Otago] and skilled Polish migrants helped build the railway lines in Otago. Interestingly, links to Poland go back to our early European history.

The Early Settlers Museum in Dunedin is currently undergoing massive renovations; making it a world class Museum and this will have a display of relics and memorabilia devoted to the Polish immigrants arrival and contribution to the development of the South Island. The opening of the new facility will be on December 7 2012.

In between her Consular role, and many other activities Winsome operates a very successful business that supplies many of the ships that visit the Port in Lyttelton with food, technical support, fishing gear and dry dock facilities. The Independent Provedoring Company Limited is a success story post earthquake by being able to stay open and keep all staff on board with business increasing. With more container traffic through Lyttelton port and many naval, Antarctic, small cruise ship and yachts visiting, the work keeps coming. These boats all need supplies and Independent Provedoring is there to make sure they are well stocked!

Building in Lyttelton

Part Four: Resource Consent Applications

If you are building, extending, re-cladding, subdividing or changing the overall use of your property in Lyttelton, then depending on the Banks Peninsula planning zone for your section, chances are you will need to apply for resource consent.

This week the Lyttelton Review talks to Liz Briggs - a highly qualified and well experienced Resource Consent Planning Consultant. Resource Consent is in addition to Building Consent and it is important to understand that the two have quite different processes. The Christchurch City Council processes a resource consent, and the Council can either decline or approve your application. If your proposal is not a "permitted activity" in the zone in which it is located, then it will require a Resource Consent as well as a Building Consent.

To a degree, the Christchurch City Council can assist you with details on the land zone applicable to your site, and guidelines on what could be built or changed as a permitted activity. But understanding what building design ideas are permitted; controlled; discretionary; restricted; non-complying or prohibited within any particular land zone can be complex and overwhelming. Rebuilding on Lyttelton's small and narrow sections is challenging. The ability to comply with the permitted rules around providing off street vehicle parking; meeting overall height restrictions in relation to the boundary; creating minimum front and side yards; or gaining a neighbour's consent for the design to take shape, is daunting and can lead to undesirable modifications to the dream plan.

Before you get too involved with the technical drawings, it would be prudent to seek independent advice from Liz. Getting early advice on a project can save you thousands of dollars. Costs incurred through application fees, specialist fees and even challenges through the Environment Court can be bitter pills to swallow if the resource consent application is declined.

Liz specialises in working with people to help them secure resource consent for their project, and she is quick to point out that her objective is not to take over the project, but rather to work alongside her clients so that they can carry out as much of the work as they feel comfortable with. Having worked within the Christchurch City Council planning team for eighteen years, Liz has the knowledge to present a case as to why attributes of a proposed design might comply with the District Plan, or why any adverse effects on the neighbourhood might be no more than minor. It costs nothing to have an initial conversation with Liz, and she is available to meet with you most week days from 9am to 5pm – either at her home office in Lyttelton, or she can meet you at a location that suits you. Show Liz your ideas, and she will be able to offer sound practical advice on taking the next steps to achieving Resource Consent.

Garden to Table Project

Diamond Harbour School Selected

A project inspired by Stephanie Alexander's Kitchen Gardens programme in Australia, this is the New Zealand adapted version of that programme. Catherine Bell of the Garden to Table Trust helps support New Zealand schools who are wanting to connect children with growing and food.

Aimed primarily at seven to ten year olds, the Garden to Table project teaches children how to "Grow, Harvest, Prepare and Share" food. The concept started in New Zealand in 2008 and the Diamond Harbour School has been given a grant by the Trust to start a project. The grant will give them the resources to adapt the curriculum to fit the programme. Driving the food project at Diamond Harbour School are several parents and the Principal Eddie Norgate. The Lyttelton Review meet with Sarah Pritchett, Lisa Hurry and Principal Norgate. It appears food is already big in school life here. The team describe their wonderful Thursday food lunches. Parents come into the school and make great meals with local produce. Some of it comes from the vegetable garden at the school. Meals cost \$1.00. "We have 117 children and generally we have eighty five participating in this food initiative" said Eddie. Thursday lunches have included delicious pizzas, courgette pancakes and carrot cakes. Food cooked is what is in season.

Being right at the very beginning of this exciting project there are many things the team have to achieve to get everything into place. They need a new garden, an upgraded kitchen and of course funding to support the already enthusiastic parents to teach the children how to cook. To date extra fundraising has seen a grant from the Canterbury Community Trust to help with the ground work for a new kitchen garden. They also received \$2,000 from Fontera which will help purchase tools, plants and improve the kitchen facility. "We need to convert the dental clinic into a commercial kitchen", said Sarah. "Not only will that make the Garden to Table project work better but other people in the community can utilise the space to create food for markets and other events". Fundraisers are already happening to make this programme come to life. A pasta making course is an event for the weekend. They have run a cheese making course and there are plans for more. This project is a great way for the school to reach out to the local community more. They talk about the wood fired pizza that they'd like to build for family events at school and on the weekend. "With one of the few large flat areas around, the school is a natural congregation point for this community" Lisa pointed out. As the visit coincides with lunch time, it is great to meet the very enthusiastic group of children who are eager to have their photos taken down by the veggie patch. They are definitely excited about this initiative.

Lyttelton Rough House Revival

The Eastern | Lindon Puffin | Delaney Davidson | Marlon Williams

It’s been a pretty long year and a bit for the port town of Lyttelton, you’ve probably heard about all the bad stuff, we don’t need to dwell, yet in amongst all of that there’s been work going on of the positive kind, shoulders to wheel, hands to the pump, glasses to the ceiling kinda stuff.

In amongst that, has been the strange phenomenon of a town of four thousand or so, punching way above its collective weight musically. Like the new hot water brought to the surface on the Rapaki shore, the town of Lyttelton has been bubbling and literally bursting with life and especially song. This spring see’s some of Lyttelton’s collective talent swaggering around New Zealand on a fourteen date tour that’ll see them circumnavigating the coast and laying waste to big and small towns alike.

Lyttelton’s own The Eastern, Lindon Puffin, Delaney Davidson and Marlon Williams [songwriter and singer from The Unfaithful Ways] will all pack up the songs, the traveling sacks and throw the banjos, fiddles, acoustic guitars, bullet mics and harmonicas in the back of the van and do together what the lot of them have been doing as individuals around New Zealand and the world for the last whole bunch of years.

Rolling out together like an old time tent show, The Lyttelton Rough House Revival Tour will be a rollicking, rough housing, roof raising, ramble through the power of the New Zealand folk song.

The Eastern need little introduction to kiwi fans of song writing, foot stomping folk music, and bar rooms. The relentless string band is continually described as New Zealand’s hardest working band and by the Dominion Post as “the first new Zealand band in a long time to do things the good old fashioned way”.

Aby putting the weight of his fifteen years of touring and singing round these Isles behind the revival, will be Lindon Puffin, also a fellow Apra Silver Scroll nominated writer and singer. With his latest record ‘Hope Holiday’ gathering critical and commercial praise, Lindon is well known as an engaging, anarchic and heartfelt presence on the highways and byways of New Zealand.

Delaney Davidson has spent most of the last year on his usual international touring circuit. Delaney describes himself as part man part wheel as he rolls his never-ending tour around Europe and the Americas and now back home with his port pals. Already this year Delaney has won the Apra Country Music Song of the Year which tops a twelve month loop where he was also a final five nominee for the 2011’s Apra Silver Scrolls and garnered stunning reviews of his ‘Bad Luck Man’ album.

Joining the mighty Davidson on stage will be Marlon Williams lead singer and songwriter from Lyttelton’s Unfaithful Ways, barely creeping into of his twenties Marlon has been fêted nation wide as the great young hope of country music. The Unfaithful Ways’ debut album ‘Free Reign’ climbed every notable end of year best list and his song writing talent was again noticed when he was nominated for song and album at this years Apra country music awards.

Shaken, battered and beat up by quake after quake in the past year, Lyttelton has proved itself to be a resilient and positive community and springing from this spirit all four acts promise to carry some of that attitude and solidarity together to other places and folks throughout the country. Big city and small town alike will no doubt be shaken by the rumble these pickers, singers and chancers will bring with them.

Winter Colds and Coughs

Coughs and colds are almost inevitable in the winter season. We have all experienced the dreaded symptoms, which often start with a dry [raspy and sore] throat, leading on to other symptoms such as coughing, sneezing, runny nose, blocked nose and headache.

Most coughs and colds are caused by different viruses that can infect the nose and throat, and are passed on by coughing and sneezing the virus into the air. The common symptoms are a cough, a runny or blocked nose, sore throat, and a headache. This is very different from the flu which comes on all of the sudden and very severely, gives you aching muscles and very high temperatures or chills. With a cold coughing does not damage the lungs, but in rare cases you can crack your ribs, or sprain a muscle. A child may have: tiredness, and be off their food as well. Sometimes children vomit after a bout of coughing, which by itself is no great concern. A build-up of mucus behind the eardrums may cause dulled hearing or mild earache also.

What can stop it, prevent it? Your own immune system is your best defence. The best way to help this is to eat a good diet that has lots of fresh fruit and vegetables, nuts, fish and other healthy oils and reduce the stress in your life to a sustainable level. If you struggle with your diet a multivitamin could help to replace what you are not getting even if only taken on your bad diet days.

Antibiotics cannot treat a cold because they are a virus. Antibiotics will be useful for a cold only if you develop a secondary bacterial infection - like a chest [pneumonia] or sinus infection [sinusitis].

What can make me feel better? Medicines can help relieve common cold symptoms, especially when you are feeling miserable and having trouble sleeping at night. Lozenges, sprays and gargles are available and make a sore throat feel a lot better, and being anti bacterial as well help to stop it turning into a throat infection. Decongestant tablets and sprays can unblock your nose for eight hours or more at a time and stop your nose running. It also allows you to breathe through your nose and not your mouth which stops your throat getting really sore as well as stopping you snoring. Antihistamine sleeping tablets can also help you have a good nights sleep. Paracetamol and ibuprofen reduce fever and relieve a head ache [but only take these if the fever is getting unbearable as a fever is one of the bodies best defences against a virus]. Cough suppressants can dull a dry irritating cough. Other cough medicines can help loosen phlegm, and stop it turning into an infection or even clear a minor one. Products with many different ingredients are available to treat more than one symptom at a time. It can be a bit confusing, so it is best to ask us for advice.

What about children? And a very important warning! Do not give medicated cough and cold medicines to children under six years of age. They aren't always effective, and can cause harm such as sedation/grumpiness or even hallucinations. Children with colds should be allowed to rest, made to feel comfortable and be given plenty of fluids. Talk us about this, and about what alternatives are okay for children and babies.

Sometimes a more serious secondary bacterial infection develops from what was just a harmless but annoying cold. For example pneumonia, sinusitis etc. If you experience the following, call your doctor:

- Breathing problems - wheeziness, pain breathing in or out, fast breathing, noisy breathing or difficulty breathing
- Unable to swallow or excessive drooling
- Very Drowsy
- Any rash
- Chest pains
- Severe or persistent headache; very sore throat; earache; swollen glands; painful face or top teeth on the same side as the pain
- A cough that persists for longer than three to four week
- Symptoms getting worse rather than better after about five days of a cold
- Symptoms lasting more than about ten days, particularly if your child has mucus or phlegm which is green, yellow or brown
- Persistent high temperatures, particularly if a baby aged less than three months has a fever higher than 38°C
- Unusual irritability or persistent crying, in a baby, or if the baby is not taking feeds
- Any symptom that you cannot explain

If you made it this far well done, we hope this helps you survive this winter with a smile. John and the team at Bells Pharmacy.

Oops! The Loons Article

In last weeks Lyttelton Review article on "The Loons for Future Generations" there were a number of errors in referencing the rebuilding and future use of the site. The building at No.16 Canterbury Street is owned by The Workings Mens Club [Lyttelton] Incorporated, and restoration of the building itself is being project managed by Neville Walker.

However, when it comes to the actual future use of the site, this is being managed by local residents Peter Evans [Volcano] and Michael Friend [The Loons Limited]. Both Peter and Michael are passionate about the relaunch of the The Loons at the Working Mens Club, and since the February 2011 earthquake they have worked tirelessly, and have dedicated thousands of hours to the huge fundraising effort required to ensure that the much loved Loons Theatre Company stays in Lyttelton. Without the drive and passion of this dedicated team The Loons might well have drawn the final curtain by now.

Once the construction work for the building is near complete The Loons Theatre Company will be responsible for the complete fit out and designation of how the space will be used. It was therefore, in hindsight, inappropriate for the Review not to seek further comment from The Loons about any finalised plans or potential future uses for the site from the brief visit.

In particular a comment was made that "*Circo Arts will come to life again*". This comment was inadvertently written in its generic form to suggest that circus styled performing acts will be returning to Lyttelton and was, in retrospect, incorrectly phrased. None of the Circo Arts Companies have ever been involved with any aspect of the fundraising, future use of site, nor operation of the Loons Theatre Company. The success of The Loons return to Lyttelton has been driven solely by those within the Loons Theatre Company.

There is not doubt that Peter and Michael have taken onboard a very ambitious project in fund raising the significant amount of money required to relaunch The Loons. The article in last weeks Review mentioned that The Lyttelton Working Mens Club had raised \$1million from various trusts, council and other donors. The Loons fundraising team would like to clarify that this figure is the total amount needed to see the return of the Loons to Lyttelton, and not the amount donated to date. Through the public profile of the Loons Theatre Company, the team are grateful for all the generous donations made to date, but wish to point out that the daunting task of raising \$1million dollars is still a considerable way from being achieved.

The Lyttelton Review wishes to apologise whole heartedly to Peter, Michael and the team at The Loons for any misunderstanding caused in last weeks issue.

End Note: Lyttelton loves the Loons. We are all eager to see them return, but any relaunch is dependent on raising the funds needed. Orton Bradley Planting Day



Diamond Harbour Historical Association

This is to remind residents that the next meeting will be held at 8.00pm on Tuesday, 14 August, 2012 in the Stage Room of the Diamond Harbour Community Hall. Our speaker will be Max Manson whose talk is entitled "Starting life at the head of the harbour: a history of the Manson family". Max's family has a long association with the Teddington area. They came to New Zealand from Kilmarnock in Scotland in 1842, initially to Nelson, then in 1843 to work for the Deans brothers at their Riccarton property. Although the Mansons had a five year contract with the Deans they were released from this after three years and both they and the Gebbie families moved to Teddington to farm on their own account. To begin with they lived in a clay cottage but about 1864 a two storeyed house was built, no doubt needed as the Mansons had seventeen children. That house was burnt down in 1936. The land at Teddington was sold in 1912 although Max farmed in the vicinity at Motukarara. Max will illustrate his talk with photos. Do encourage your friends and neighbours to join us on the 14th as this will be a most fascinating talk about one of our old Lyttelton harbour families.

Hello, my name is Andrea Haberfield, and I am the co-ordinator of Junior Neighbourhood Support in Christchurch - junior meaning working with children five to thirteen years old. I have been a Primary School teacher all of my career and I have spent time working as an Assistant Principal in a Christchurch school. I am absolutely thrilled to be able to bring our special programme into Lyttelton Main School and into Lyttelton West School. There are 13 schools in the programme. The aim of the programme is: 'To Promote a Sense of Pride, Safety and Community Spirit in children, their schools and their wider community.' It is supported by the New Zealand Police, the New Zealand Fire Service, Civil Defence and the Ministry of Social Development. The objectives of the programme are: To teach Neighbourhood Support values; To promote Safety, Fire and Civil Defence awareness; and To reward positive initiatives, attitudes and behaviour

The programme acknowledges students who are contributing to their school and community in a really positive way. Students can be nominated for an award by parents, caregivers, principals and staff in schools, neighbours, or others in the community. Nomination forms are kept in the white Junior Neighbourhood Support letterboxes in the school foyers or students can be nominated through our website – www.nscanterbury.org.nz. Twice each term, at school assemblies, the nominated students are presented with a special certificate and a sponsored prize. When it is possible these are presented by one of the Emergency Services representatives, for example, the S.P.C.A, the Police, St John or the Fire Service. These representatives also give a safety message to the students.

Andrew Turner, from the Lyttelton Mount Herbert Community Board, approached me about the possibility of having Junior Neighbourhood Support in Lyttelton and I really appreciate the wonderful support that he has given me. He is thrilled that the programme has started. I am excited about having contact with the Lyttelton community & getting to know more of you. Lyttelton Reserves Management Committee Update

The Lyttelton Reserves Management Committee met on July 16th, and have released the following updates:

Urumau Reserve Fire: The Head Ranger, Mr Devlin, gave a full account of the action carried out with regard to the Fire in the Urumau Reserve on the morning of 25 May 2012. It would appear the fire was lit by persons unknown with the resulting unattended fire causing considerable damage to the vegetation on the eastern side of the hill above the Port coal holding facility. The fire was contained with the use of twenty two flights of monsoon bucket carrying rotary wing aircraft. This was a night operation with the aircraft operators using night flying vision goggles which proved successful. Signs warning of fire danger are proposed for the area.

Reserve Closures: The Urumau and Whaka Raupo Reserves continue to be closed on account of the danger of rock fall. Christchurch City Council staff and geologists are working hard to make parts of the Urumu Resereve safe for public access.

How to Make the World a Better Place: A Guide to Doing Good, 1990: Jeffrey Hollender

The writer presents 124 specific actions you can take that will make a difference. The areas are: protecting the environment; food, hunger and agriculture; socially responsible banking and investment; the responsible consumer; peace, non-violence and human rights. Of course, some of the information has been overtaken in the last 20 years, and some references may be out-of-date, but the ideas and many details are still valid and important.

Christchurch Transport Plan

The Draft Christchurch Transport Plan is the Council's 30-year vision to keep Christchurch moving forward by providing transport choices that connect people and places.

Principles to achieve the vision and shape the Council's future investment are established in the plan. This will ensure Christchurch has a network of safer streets, efficient vehicle and freight routes, attractive cycle ways, easy pedestrian access and public transport infrastructure that makes it an attractive and economical travel choice for a greater number of people.

The Draft Plan acknowledges that the priority for Council during the next decade will be to replace the city's earthquake-damaged infrastructure, while using this work as an opportunity to shift towards a more sustainable transport network.

The Draft Plan has now been released, and the Christchurch City Council is now inviting feedback from residents. Submissions close at 5pm on Thursday 23 August. Lyttelton Review is Relevant

Last week the Christchurch City Council released Felicity Price's "2012 Communications Audit Research Report". Those who participated in the research were asked about where they sourced information concerning council decisions. This question was broken down into "primary source of information" and "secondary source of information". Under the Primary Source, The Press, Television and Radio were the favoured responses, no surprises there.

Yet here is where it gets exciting for the Lyttelton Review. Under the Secondary Source of Information, Community or Free Newspapers rated as being a relevant source of information for 22% of the Banks Peninsula respondents. Now, we could go thinking this is credit to the well known community paper brands available across Christchurch, but this 22% support only came from the Banks Peninsula region. Other areas that also receive these the free community papers, such as Ferrymead-Hagley, tracked on average, at 5.3% support for Community or Free Newspapers.

So what is it that makes a difference in the Banks Peninsula - the Lyttelton Review. At least, this is what we think!

Brothel By-Law Update

Last week a Christchurch City Council hearings panel is listened to 17 submissions on the council's proposed bylaw to restrict the areas where brothels are allowed to operate. Under the bylaw, most brothels would be required to be located within certain commercial areas and away from schools and designated "important open spaces", such as Cathedral Square and the Avon River. Existing large brothels and small owner-operated brothels would be exempt. The proposed bylaw attracted nearly two hundred submissions from residents and organisations, with a high proportion of these submissions coming from Lyttelton.

Lyttelton-Mt Herbert Community Board chairwoman Paula Smith said smaller owner-operated brothels were "acceptable" for the Lyttelton area, but residents did not want "large-scale operations" allowed in the town centre.

Lyttelton's town centre was a "real mixture" of businesses, restaurants and residences, whereas the other areas identified around Christchurch as being suitable for brothels were "more industrial". Paula Smith did not think there had been any issues with prostitution in Lyttelton in recent years, but she was concerned the proposed bylaw may have "highlighted" Lyttelton as a potential site for operator-run brothels.

Councillor Helen Broughton, chairwoman of the panel, responding by saying the council could be seen as "prohibiting" prostitution if it did not allow operator-run brothels in Lyttelton's town centre. !

Christchurch Earthquake Award Nominations

The Christchurch City Council is seeking nominations in a second round of the Christchurch Earthquake Awards to recognise people who may have been missed previously. The earthquake awards were presented for the first time in February 2012 and are being held a second time to give people who were previously unaware of the awards an opportunity to nominate a worthy candidate. The awards are to honour people who undertook acts of kindness, service or heroism during the earthquakes.

Nominations open today, Monday 23 July, and will close on Friday 21 September 2012.

Mayor Bob Parker says there was a great response to the awards in February and this second call for nominations would ensure people who missed out last time were recognised for their acts of service, kindness or heroism. "Our community has been through an extraordinary two years and we want to ensure that all those that acted selflessly to help others are aware of how much we appreciate their actions. "The nomination period will run for two months this time so that there is enough opportunity for everyone deserving to be nominated."

Individuals, associations, organisations and businesses are eligible for the Christchurch Earthquake Awards and nominations are open to people of all ages. There is a requirement that the services or acts presented for civic commendation have been performed in direct relation to the earthquakes. The nominations will be considered by the Council and awards presented at a special ceremony to be held in November 2012. People who have been nominated previously cannot be nominated again.

Communication audit report to be considered

Christchurch City Council's Community, Recreation and Culture Committee will next week consider a series of recommendations in response to an independent Communication Audit Report commissioned earlier this year. The review of the Council's communication function was commissioned by the Chief Executive in January. The aim of the review was to identify what the Council is doing well and what needs to improve, in particular: the processes, structures and systems used to communicate internally and externally.

The report makes a series of recommendations which it says outline "a need for Council [elected members and management] to adopt a culture of open communication and engagement with residents and stakeholders so that the Council can build understanding and mutual support for its objectives, plans and decisions".

Chief Executive Tony Marryatt says the findings of the audit report are a timely reminder that the Council can always do a better job of keeping residents informed. "It's important to engage with the community and we accept all of the findings of the review. In many cases, we had already identified the issues raised and taken steps to address them. Staff have recommended a number of actions to address the issues raised and these will be considered by Councillors at next week's committee meeting. This exercise was actually something our Communications Team was planning to initiate in the middle of 2010 but then the earthquakes intervened. We should always be asking: what can we do better? That's good practice and we have done that by commissioning this review," Mr Marryatt says.

Community, Recreation and Culture Committee Chairman Yani Johanson says involving the community in Council decision-making and keeping residents informed is very important and the Council needs to make sure it gets this right. "I look forward to the committee having the opportunity to consider the staff responses to the audit report next week. It is my belief that good communication and transparent engagement is critical both in normal time, and even more so in a post-disaster environment. The report raises a number of well-known but significant issues which I believe are essential for the Council to address in order to improve the good governance of our city."
