Saturday Grassy Market

It is wonderful how Lyttelton has evolved into a vibrant market town on Saturdays. The Grassy Market in Oxford Street has been operating for about six years. Started by Ladona Anslow and Thea Mickell as a fund raiser for Kidz First Kindergarten the market has been run by Ros Dixon for the last five years.

The stall holders money is a fundraiser that at first was solely for the Kidsfirst kindergarten and Lyttelton Main School. Later it became a fundraiser for Volcano Radio as well. Since the Earthquakes the funding will now be for Lyttelton Main School and the Lyttelton Youth Centre

If you haven't been to the market it's a jumble of second hand and new hand crafted fabulous things. Ros says "We try to keep the balance 50/50, however since the earthquakes that has varied. Stallholders vary from week to week but generally you'll find vintage and new clothing, tools, jewellery, books, kitchen utensils and many other varied and interesting bits and pieces".


Ros lets us in on her plans for the market. With the Lyttelton Youth Centre, she's hoping once a month the youth will take over running of the music for the market. "They will be able to play their music, learn how to set up a PA and mix the tracks. It will be their day for the sounds" Ros said.

Events are also going to feature as the market moves forward. Late November Ros talks about the street art competition she is planning. She really wants youth to have a place where they can express themselves through street art. "At the moment the historic walls are being used for tagging and I would like to encourage a legitimate space for youth and older people to express themselves in public". The competition is just the start and then we can look at getting permanent boards around Lyttelton.

Ros is planning to erect some boards on the fencing where youth can paint for the competition with their street art. Eventually she is hoping there might be a permanent site in Lyttelton that is dedicated to street art. "I lived in Hamburg for years and the artwork was just amazing. There were places where it is legal for street art that could and should happen here", she said.

The Grassy market is a must visit Lyttelton space when you are out and about in Lyttelton on a Saturday morning.

Stalls cost \$10 each week so it's really good value for money. If you'd like to give her a helping hand, especially for the pack down she would like to hear from you. Amazing Antarctic Experiences

Lyttelton IceFest Speaker Series: Four Local People Creating History

Some stories are happy, uplifting and informative whilst others are equally important and informative but hard listening. The Icefest Speakers series in Lyttelton concluded last Thursday evening with three very unique but amazing stories from John Bradshaw, Paul Barrett, Henry Sunderland and Mark Penn.

Each of the speakers have contributed to Antarctic history in their own unique and special way and each of their stories deserves an entire article in its own right.

John Bradshaw, a geologist gave us some interesting insights about the continent as he travelled around West and East Antarctica by sea. Did you know the Ross Ice Shelf is almost the same size as France? That Argentina and Chile have disputes over Deception Island? There is a Chilean township with 51 permanent people that live on King George Island? That there is a permanent place where you can buy souvenirs?

Paul Barrett and Henry Sunderland looked at creativity and technology as a road map to environmental protection on the ice. Paul helps Antarctic New Zealand with their environmental management system. How can Antarctic New Zealand ensure the environment is looked after well and we tread as lightly as possible on it? Paul helps them devise systems to measure their impact and improve outcomes. He revealed that Antarctic New Zealand is only one of 1000 companies in New Zealand that even has such a programme! This is where Henry steps in rather nicely. How can we get people to think more about our environment? By using creative methods he can help to keep people focused on important issues. Henry a “gnomeologist” uses his playful gnomes to keep environmental sustainability in peoples minds. His gnomes, dotted around the Antarctic serve as a reminder of this and the word gnome now has a new meaning “guarding naturally over mother earth”. The gnomes are a perfect way to stop people in their tracks and get them thinking about this important issue.

As an aside to this important issue Paul also told the story of the important case that he helped load onto the back of a truck during his last visit. It turned out to be the famous case of whiskey found at Shackleton’s hut! As he said, “Every visit down south is creating a piece of Antarctic history”.

Mark Penn had the most sobering tale of them all. A former policeman who thirty three years ago in the middle of a court room was interrupted by another local policeman Robin Loader asking Mr Penn to be excused from the case because he’d been seconded to Antarctica to help with Operation Overdue, the Mount Erebus recovery effort for flight TE901 that had gone down with 257 people. Mark, a team of policemen, mountaineers and safety officers were sent on a C130 Hercules the following day to the frozen continent. Days of hard gruelling work followed. Two teams worked twelve hour shifts in endless daylight. In all twenty five men camped above the crash scene in freezing conditions registering the bodies from the flight scene to be sent back to Auckland. A task no one could have experience for but a task they did with dignity and compassion.

Thirty years later the New Zealand Government struck the Erebus Medal for the fabulous efforts of the teams that helped with the recovery effort. Mark was asked to speak at the awards at the New Zealand Embassy in Washington to Americans who helped the New Zealanders during that terrible period. It was a great opportunity to catch up with old mates and sign off a terrible chapter in aviation history.

Notice of Temporary Lifting of Fire Ban

Christchurch City Council is temporarily lifting its ban on outdoors open fires in urban areas to allow for burning over spring. The ban, which has been in place since Monday 30 April 2012, was lifted from Saturday 8 September 2012 until further notice.

The existing prohibition on open fires is imposed pursuant to Section 11 of the Christchurch City Urban Fire Safety Bylaw 2007 and is in force for properties not zoned residential in Christchurch City and its urban 'fire districts' of Lyttelton, Governors Bay, Diamond Harbour, Little River and Akaroa.

Please note that this temporary lifting of the ban coincides with the lifting of Environment Canterbury's Clean Air Winter Period fire ban [on 31 August 2012].

Help Us Paint Out Graffiti

You have probably seen graffiti or tagging somewhere around town. It is the words, colours and shapes drawn or painted on home owner's fences and letterboxes or on utility boxes, light posts or council buildings and bus stops. It ranges from simple, one colour nicknames called "tags" through to complex arrangements of several colours. It is done without permission. It is wilful damage. It is against the law. Graffiti is a crime.

Graffiti vandalism or tagging is a community problem. Overseas studies have shown that if graffiti or tagging is left, it creates an environment where other, more serious crimes such as burglary and assault take hold. Graffiti continues to be a problem in Lyttelton.

If you haven't noticed the graffiti around town, it might be because a member of the Lyttelton Tag Busters volunteer group or the Christchurch City Council has cleaned it up fairly quickly. But recently Lyttelton has been severely "tag bombed" with more tags than ever before, and members of the Lyttelton Tag Busters are always pleased to help and encourage new volunteers to help in the fight against this senseless vandalism of Lyttelton.

The aim of Lyttelton Tag Busters is have graffiti removed with twenty four hours. The typical tagger repeats their destructive scrawl as many times as possible to advertise to other taggers for recognition and status. If the graffiti is removed quickly, the taggers are denied their glory.

Report all tags to Christchurch City Council Graffiti Office, and including information such as:

- street location [where is the tagging]
- what the tag is on [building, fence, pole]
- what the tag was done with [spray paint, pen]
- an image of the actual tag [this goes onto a taggers database as evidence when caught]

For tags on Council and all public owned property

Contact the council graffiti office on 03 941 8999 or email graffitioffice@ccc.govt.nz. As a general rule the Council graffiti team are prompt in responding to calls for graffiti removal. When you lodge a notification about some graffiti, the Council will give you a job number. Write this number down, so if a day or two passes without action, you will be able to follow it up with the Council.

For tags on Orion electricity boxes

Orion are happy for the community to paint over these with a matching paint colour [generally black or green] and Lyttelton Tag Busters can supply you with black, grey and Orion green paint. Just contact the Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre for more details on this group.

For tags on private property

Talk to the property owner about helping them remove the tagging. They may have left over paint to do the job, but not the time or physical fitness to remove the tag.

Graffiti is a crime, so if you see someone tagging, write down a clear description of the person and report it to the police. Ideally take a photo of the tag and take this along to the Police station.

If your property has been tagged you may be eligible for assistance from the council, just give them a call on 0800 VANDAL or 03 941 8999.

Banks Peninsula GeoPark

Potentially a First For New Zealand

At the beginning of September a small number of Banks Peninsula people were invited to a meeting to consider the possibility of applying for Banks Peninsula or a part of, to become a UNESCO Geopark.

UNESCO or the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization support the concept of Geoparks: Promoting Earth Heritage, Sustaining Local Communities and the development of a Global Network of National Geoparks: a landscape approach for geological heritage conservation, research and sustainable development.

Support for investigating this proposition further has resulted in the idea of publicising this initiative to the wider Banks Peninsula community, inviting comment before calling a further meeting of interested parties to make some decisions on the way forward, if any.

Readers are invited to email comments to bpgeopark@gmail.com and to express whether or not they are interested in participating in a meeting to be held later in October [venue & date to be advised once I have an indication of numbers interested].

A précis of the criteria for and purpose of a Geopark includes:

- Clearly defined boundaries.
- Part of a holistic concept of protection, education to stimulate economic activity within a framework of culturally and environmentally sustainable development.
- Must be large enough to serve local economic development.
- Sites of international, regional or national importance [science, rarity, education and/or aesthetics].
- Synergy between geo-diversity, biodiversity, culture and heritage.
- Based on strong community support, local involvement and “bottom-up” process.
- Involve public authorities, local communities, private interests, research & educational bodies.
- Stimulation of innovative local enterprise, small business, cottage industry, supplementary income for local population, cultural development and “pride of place”.
- Education .
- Protection and Conservation .

Sue Lovett from Matua Gardens says “the concept first came to my attention in an article <http://www.stuff.co.nz/travel/international/7469090/The-emerging-trend-of-geotourism> I followed up by going to the UNESCO website for more information; asked a few people and received generally positive responses and encouragement.”

To date many volunteers from various groups have invested significant time, energy and funds into Banks Peninsula business, tourism, conservation, history and culture. The Geopark concept appears to be a unique opportunity to combine the interests and opportunities without having to reinvent the wheel. Given the recent events affecting the region this may be a timely opportunity to address the many and varied complex issues confronting not just Banks Peninsula but Canterbury as a whole.

Geoparks are not just about attracting tourists. The concept is about enhancing communities, facilities, events, education, business opportunities, heritage, culture, conservation, geology and education. Given the focus on proposed school closures my thought that the timing could be right for this is reinforced.



Both Christine and Sam have a passion for helping others on their Life Journey, whatever form that may take for the individual, and firmly believe that wellness is directly linked to following your passion.



University of Canterbury CEISMIC Programme

The University of Canterbury CEISMIC programme is based on principles of openness and collaboration, to ensure maximum utility to researchers, the public and future generations. When the University first decided to build an archive of earthquake-related digital content they knew they wanted to store images, stories, and media, and that they wanted to avoid the fragmentation that often results when a variety of organizations build repositories that can't share with each other. A bright spark came up with the CEISMIC acronym [Canterbury Earthquake Images, Stories and Media Integrated Collection] and interest snow-balled.

And now the University of Canterbury's QuakeBox is coming to Lyttelton! The University will be collecting the earthquake stories of Harbour Basin residents which will be included in the University's CEISMIC project. The aim of the University of Canterbury QuakeBox project is to connect with a broad variety of Canterbury communities, and it has been to a variety of locations around Christchurch during the year.

The QuakeBox is being run by the New Zealand Institute for Language Brain and Behaviour [NZILBB], and is a joint venture with University of Canterbury CEISMIC, the digital archive project being developed by the University of Canterbury. Council Releases GNS Reports on Port Hills

Late last week the Christchurch City Council released seven detailed technical reports on slope instability on the Port Hills. These are now available on the Council's website. These reports were prepared for the Council by GNS Science in response to the Canterbury earthquakes and contain information to help Council address life-safety risks from rock fall and boulder roll and cliff collapse on the Port Hills.

"The findings were used by CERA to assist with decisions on zoning and are going to be used by the Council for infrastructure, planning and regulatory matters," says Council Strategy and Planning General Manager Mike Theelen. "The maps which accompany the reports will assist people to understand each report." Mr Theelen says a series of three summary brochures have also been prepared to explain the technical terms and concepts used in the reports. These summary documents are also available on the Council's website.

"The information in these reports is technical and complex. However, it was important to release the information for our community to have the opportunity to view the full technical reports and recommendations which were used by central government to make zoning decisions. The reports will also be used by the Council to carry out its regulatory functions, such as considering resource and building consent applications, and in the review of its District Plans," he says.

"Because of the complexity of the information, the Council is working with the University of Canterbury to host a public geotechnical information seminar on Saturday 13 October at which the public can come along and learn more about the information in the GNS Science reports." Details of this event, will be released once finalised later this week.

Cable Here for Orion Project

SCIRT to Start on Route October

What weighs about 270 tonnes, stretches nearly 16 kilometres and will take 18 road trips over three days? The answer is a massive logistical challenge which this week sees eighteen enormous drums of high voltage cable moved from Lyttelton to Christchurch where it will be used to strengthen the power supply to the north-eastern suburbs. The 66,000 volt [high voltage] cables arrived at Lyttelton last Friday. This is Orion's largest cable purchase since 2000 and is stage one of a three stage project to deliver a more secure supply to eastern Christchurch. This project is just one of \$870m worth of projects planned over the next 10 years to improve and enhance electricity supply in the Orion network area.

The final destination for the cable is underground between Orion's McFaddens zone substation to Dallington zone substation. While that distance spans just over five kilometres of road, Orion will use nearly 16 kilometres of cable for the project. That's because it will use three lengths of cable to maintain a three phase system in the power supply network.

This new high voltage underground circuit will mean a more secure power supply and fewer power cuts for those in the north-eastern suburbs of Christchurch," said Rob Jamieson, chief executive of Orion. "Importantly for the rebuild of Christchurch, this circuit will be part of a high voltage power ring that will both restore the reliability of power supply and provide for growth."

To minimise disruption, Orion is working alongside SCIRT which is repairing other underground services and roads along the same route. SCIRT has been contracted to excavate the cable route. Laying the cable is expected to begin in early October and finish in April 2013. "Those residents directly affected will have work notices put in their letterboxes in advance of the works beginning," says Duncan Gibb, SCIRT General Manager. "We are working with Orion and other utility providers to maximise opportunities for collaboration and cost-saving. It makes sense to do this whenever we can."

The cable is split into sections each about 900 metres which are spooled onto individual drums. "There will be 18 drums of cable to be transported from Lyttelton to Christchurch," explained Chris Birkett Managing Director of Christchurch Based General Cable New Zealand Ltd. "Each weighs around 15 tonnes and is nearly four metres high. Specialised low loader trailer units will be used but the choice of route is restricted by the size of the load. The Lyttelton tunnel is not big enough and Evans Pass is still closed due to the earthquake so the trucks will need to come to town via Gebbies Pass. We will be working closely with Orion throughout this project to support this important step in the Christchurch rebuild," says Mr Birkett.

Temporary Accommodation Allowance Extended

Available to March 2015

Canterbury Earthquake Recovery Minister Gerry Brownlee says residents whose dwellings have been seriously affected by the earthquakes can be reassured that financial support remains available, following the extension of the Government's Temporary Accommodation Allowance. "The Temporary Accommodation Allowance was originally designed for people whose homes were made uninhabitable by the 4 September 2010 earthquake, and whose insurance cover for temporary accommodation was about to run out," Mr Brownlee says. "The allowances were made available on 17 February 2011 and to date \$12.56 million support has been paid to 1827 families and individuals. "Last week \$363,455 was paid to 1318 families and individuals."

The accommodation allowance is for home owners and can be used to cover rent, board and motel stays. It is not means tested and offers support of up to \$330 per week, depending on the family commitments of the applicants. Mr Brownlee says the allowance was originally intended to be available until February 2013, based on the extent of damage and projected demand following the first major earthquake to hit the region on 4 September 2010. "Obviously the 22 February 2011 quake resulted in far greater damage to people's homes, hence the need to extend the scheme. In some instances the time frames for residents' assistance through insurance cover will run out, so residents will now have access to the programme until 1 March 2015."
