Free Wifi on London Street

What is the Story?

Back in April the Lyttelton Review revealed that the Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre was successful in obtaining a grant from Internet NZ for the introduction of free wifi for Lyttelton's town centre, with the view to ensuring this service would be available for a three year period. The rationale was that it would be a recovery project for the town and supported the goal identified in the master plan.

What is WiFi?

WiFi, as defined by the Ministry of Health¹, is a way to connect a computer or other mobile device to a computer network using low power radio signals. It may be used to replace cable connections in the home, school or office or to provide mobile internet access through so-called “wireless hot spots” in cities, at airports and in other locations.

The funding grant received will provide Lyttelton with a free public WiFi network to extend from Oxford Street to Canterbury Street along London Street. The Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre sought funding for this project based on the positive feedback from residents to the Lyttelton Master Plan process that identified this as one of the townships recovery projects. To implement the network it is proposed that three small four watt WiFi units will be installed at the top of light poles located along London Street.

Since news was released of the successful grant application, some residents have been questioning the safety of the WiFi system. Whilst some people wanted more information, some residents think that this system should not be implemented on the grounds of claimed health impacts. They claim that the electromagnetic radiation emitted is dangerous to health because it is cumulative and has proven biological impacts on life.

Not being technical experts in the field of WiFi, the Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre board have set about to find out more information on WiFi networks. They have sought expert advice from government, technical experts and anyone who expressed concern about the topic. This article is the result of their findings.

In support of WiFi:

The World Health Organisation issued Fact Sheet 304 in May 2006 which stated: “Considering the very low exposure levels and research results collected to date, there is no convincing scientific evidence that the weak Radio Frequency signals from base stations and wireless networks cause adverse health effects”.

This view is also supported by the Radiation Safety Laboratory at the University of Princeton: “It is the general consensus of the scientific community that the level of Radio Frequency exposure due to wireless networks is so low compared to the many other Radio Frequency sources in the modern environment that health concerns from WiFi exposure are not an issue.”

Frequently Asked Questions

Can exposure to WiFi signals be harmful?

According to the Ministry of Health New Zealand the answer is no². They say measurements in New Zealand and overseas show that exposure to WiFi signals are tiny fractions of the public exposure limit in the New Zealand radio frequency field exposure. The Ministry of Health claims that standard exposures are low for three main reasons:

- The low power of the transmitter
- The rapid decrease in signal strength with increasing distance from the transmitter
- The fact that no signal is transmitted when no data is being transferred [except for brief “beacon signals”]

Do people get electromagnetic hypersensitivity from Radio Frequency radiation?

The Swedish Radioactive Safety Laboratory concludes that while the perceived symptoms of people with electromagnetic hypersensitivity are real, there is no evidence to link this to Radio Frequency exposure³. There are also multiple examples of studies that conclude the same results, search: Wifi Wikipedia

Is WiFi dangerous in New Zealand Schools?

In September 2011 the New Zealand Ministry of Health advised the Ministry of Education “that in the Ministry of Health’s view, the installation of WiFi equipment in schools does not pose a health risk to staff or students in the areas where it is used”. They further report that “no special precautions are needed when using WiFi equipment, if parents or staff do have concerns to place the wireless access point up on a high shelf, and that computers are put on tables and not laps.”⁴

Have there been any court cases looking at this issue in New Zealand?

In 1998 Shirley Primary School took the Christchurch City Council to court claiming that the cell phone tower near the school was detrimental to the health of the children. The Environment Court ruled that the risks associated with the tower in causing health issues for children were 1:1,000,000. The risk was considered so small that no actual adverse health effects could be quantified.

What is happening in overseas schools?

Some schools in Europe have chosen to adopt a precautionary approach. This is evident in Sweden and France. In many schools there are no WiFi networks only hard wired systems.

How much radiation do you get from a hotspot?

The Health Protection Agency United Kingdom says someone sitting in a WiFi hotspot for a year would receive the same dose of radio waves as someone using a mobile phone for 20 minutes. The Health Protection Agency also believes that on the basis of current scientific information WiFi satisfies international guidelines. There is no consistent evidence of health effects from RF exposures below guideline levels and there no reason for schools and others not to use WiFi systems.⁵

What is the extent of the WiFi Network in London Street now?

Currently there are WiFi networks in London Street, and operating along the entire length of London Street. This network is mostly a private network. The proposed new network will enable free public access for the whole area. Some people argue that the new network means they will not be able to come down the street because they will be impacted by the radio waves. The radio waves already exist, and the free system will make no difference.

Is WiFi a possible carcinogen identified by the World Health Organisation?

The answer is “it is possibly carcinogenic to humans”. It should be noted that many other products that we use on a daily basis are also identified as “possibly carcinogenic to humans”. Coffee comes to mind immediately. The impact of diesel particulates is another. There are many known carcinogens in our modern lives now.

Comments not in support for WiFi

Just because you cannot prove something, it does not mean it is not harmful. Until you know the real causes you should adopt the precautionary principle.

The current standards for radio frequency radiation are not adequate for public health.

The possible health effects in children associated with radio frequency fields have not been fully investigated.⁶

We don't know the long term effects on small children exposed for long periods of time.⁷

New WiFi systems are more powerful.⁸

Some schools, libraries and universities have banned the use of WiFi. This is true in some Swedish and French schools.⁹

Current standards do not take into account the biological impact of the technology "exposure limits were based on physical deliberations solely accepting the existence of biological effects through temperature increase. The occurrence of biological effects far below the exposure limits was totally neglected".¹⁰

More doctors and medical associations are coming out calling for safer technologies in schools because they do believe there are adverse biological impacts on young children.¹¹

Many are saying only have hard wired systems in hospitals and schools and recommend that because they are uncertain of the impact, and to limit exposure to electromagnetic radiation as much as you can.¹²



In Conclusion:

Based on the limited research undertaken by the Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre, the free WiFi network proposed for the Lyttelton town centre meets current New Zealand government and health guidelines. Lyttelton has already embraced the benefits of WiFi with many businesses, homes and schools using the technology. Under the Lyttelton Master Plan, the Christchurch City Council have identified that new buildings, events and WiFi on London Street, and internal laneways through the town centre, will play a pivotal role in building levels of activity, energy and vitality.

Many city and town centres are using digital technology [WiFi] as a modern, engaging communication platform. WiFi networks can be a dynamic way of increasing the visibility and appeal of the town centre and to ensure it is business friendly. The scheme could allow people with laptops, iPads and mobile devices to connection through a Lyttelton portal to local content that promotes the town, businesses and the community, and to check emails. Offering free public access to a wireless internet network in the Lyttelton town centre would be an effective way of promoting the town, businesses and the community to a wider audience [particularly amongst young people].¹³

For residents who are concerned, it is suggested that you revert back to hard wired networks. For those who want to use the technology, think about switching the devices off when you are not using them to reduce electromagnetic radiation smog. It is the intention of the Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre to recommend this for the free public network. Also consider putting the router further away from your body. If you use a cell phone, do not have it on your body. Carry it in a bag, and always use the headset when taking calls.

Local Design Input -v- Council Lead Approach

CCC Staff Recommend the Council Planning Committee DECLINE a Lyttelton Urban Design Panel

Section B3 "Local Input into Design and Appearance" of the Lyttelton Master Plan adopted by the Christchurch City Council on 21 June 2012, is now under debate with the Council Planning Committee recommending that Lyttelton does not get an Urban Design Committee.

To refresh the memory bank, Section B3 of the Lyttelton Master Plan states:

Within Lyttelton there is a body of appropriately qualified design professionals who can help ensure high quality development that is appropriate for the context and is aligned with this master plan's vision. Some of these professionals have already assisted by peer reviewing the Draft Lyttelton Master Plan.

Draft Lyttelton Master Plan recommended: Inclusion of local involvement in the existing Urban Design Panel - recognised desire for local input and benefits of aligning with existing Christchurch Urban Design Panel.

Final Lyttelton Master Plan was changed to read: Local input into design and appearance - amended to accommodate whatever is determined to be the best means of providing for local input as per Council resolution.

The question is: do Lyttelton residents wish to be directly involved in the urban redesign process for Lyttelton; or should this process be left up to the Council to decide which "favoured out of town consultant" can be engaged to deliver the future for Lyttelton?

The Lyttelton Review questioned the Lyttelton Mt Herbert Community Board on their thoughts, and here are seven excellent reasons why the Community Board supports the establishment of a Lyttelton Urban Design Advisory Committee:

There is strong community interest in Lyttelton urban design matters. Community Board enquiry during the development of the Lyttelton Community Recovery Plan in April 2011 identified widespread community interest in urban design matters in Lyttelton, particularly built form [buildings], heritage and character. This is also evident in the extraordinary level of community engagement in the Lyttelton Master Plan processes.

The Lyttelton community seeks partnership with Council in the rebuild. Key community groups in Lyttelton have expressed a wish for close collaboration with CCC on rebuild matters in general; not just consultation, but a working partnership.

Lyttelton people have a "do-it-ourselves" attitude. Lyttelton people are proud of their self-sufficiency. This "do-it-ourselves" attitude is a key attribute in the community's resilience. An urban design advisory structure which includes respected and knowledgeable locals appointed by community representatives, along with well qualified technical experts, would contribute positively to this ethos.

Individuals in Lyttelton have valuable local knowledge. Community members have detailed understanding of underlying history and local social and ecological processes which, when integrated with expert technical design advice, will yield better urban design outcomes for Lyttelton. An Urban Design Panel without a local knowledge component may yield urban design outcomes which are not such a good fit.

The Community Board Committee model has worked well for some time on Banks Peninsula. The Akaroa Design and Appearance Advisory Committee has worked well since 1978. Both Lyttelton and Akaroa have Historic Area status under the Historic Place Act.

An Urban Design Advisory Committee in Lyttelton will not necessarily lead to a committee in every Christchurch ward. Lyttelton is a distinct and separate town operating under a separate section of the Christchurch District Plan. The Banks Peninsula section of the District Plan requires greater "active implementation" to achieve objectives than the more prescriptive "City Plan". Local involvement in advising applicants and decision-makers will contribute to more effective implementation of the district plan with improved community acceptance of consent decisions as a likely by-product.

A Lyttelton Urban Design Advisory Committee is consistent with the Urban Design Protocol. Combining professional expertise with local knowledge is more closely aligned with key urban design qualities check-listed in the Urban Design Protocol ["the seven Cs"] in particular with Collaboration, by "involving communities in meaningful decision-making" which over time will contribute to an urban design outcome for Lyttelton which is a closer expression of local culture and identity.

A recent recommendation to the CCC Planning Committee does not recommend an Urban Design Panel for Lyttelton. If you want to have your say please book a deputation to the Council meeting on October 25th. Phone: 03 941 8999

Plenty of Heritage Remains

Take a Closer Look at Our Remaining Heritage Buildings

Buildings have come and gone from the Lyttelton town centre. Fires, earthquakes, upgrades, you name it. Yet plenty of pre-1900 historic buildings remain standing. This week the Lyttelton Review asks the question: what can we learn from these buildings?

An interesting walk with David Bundy in the town centre reveals that there is one era of buildings that have survived all the seismic activity well. These buildings date from 1870 to the early 1900's. Characterised by wood and corrugated iron, not only are the buildings strong but they are still able to be occupied and used today and meet the current building code for structural integrity and strength.

According to David these buildings have survived well because of the construction methods employed. "Timber framing is not made floor by floor for these buildings instead there are continuous lengths of wood that support the entire structure. This structure is then made stronger with interior match lining which has often had numerous linings fixed on top adding to the strength and integrity of the building" he said.

"Many of the buildings are also rectangular and with tin roofs nailed to the rafters the entire structure is linked together. When we have an earthquake the buildings sway like anything but they just pop back into place afterwards" he said

As we take our walk looking at all the remaining buildings he highlights the ones that have employed these construction techniques. In total there are 17 buildings that remain in the business area. They include: Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre, Tin Palace, Former Milly May and Satchmo building, Harbour Co-Op, Coffee Culture, former Small Business Accounting and Barbershop, Portico, Bells Pharmacy, Min Sarginson, BNZ Bank, Freemans, the former real estate office, the building next to the Loons, Independent Provadoring Office, the former Signal House, the British Hotel and the former Carousel shop.

Some of these might surprise you. A characteristic of these old buildings is they were easy to modify. The British Hotel is a classic example David Says. "The exterior was changed to brick façade years ago but the bones behind that were wood and tin".

It's rather ironic that David's building on London Street will now become offices for the Christchurch City Council. The existing service centre, a 1970-80's building only meets 10% of the strength requirements of the current building code whereas David's older building comes in at nearly 70% of the code. It's a similar story for the Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre, with a structural strength rated at 67% of the current building code.

As an aside David would like us to know that his building initially began life as the Harp of Erin boarding house run by an immigrant Irish family with a family name of Cains. Bed and breakfast was one shilling! Some of the family decedents are still in Lyttelton. David says "I get fascinated by the history and connections that these old buildings bring, it adds a lot of depth to our community".

David rightly asks the question, "Are people looking to these remaining buildings for models for the future re-build"? They have passed the seismic tests exceptionally well. To our knowledge only one of these buildings did not survive the earthquakes and it was pulled down by accident. Interestingly two new buildings are going up in Norwich Quay that reflect the character of the buildings that survived well!

We may have lost some of our heritage but we certainly have quite a range of building left and we [locals and officials] all need to be asking ourselves why those buildings performed well? They do hold some of the keys for our re-build and whether heritage should or shouldn't remain central to our re-built town centre.

Farewell Shadbolt House

Demolition of Lyttelton's old port company building, Shadbolt House, started last week after it was deemed too badly earthquake-damaged to repair. Lyttelton's only high rise building, owned by Independent Fisheries since the 1990s, has been vacant since it was damaged in the February 2011 quake.

Independent Fisheries General Manager, Mark Allison said the company had looked at repairing the building but found the cost of strengthening required to bring it up to the building code uneconomic because of its age. The company also owned the Royal Hotel and the Lyttelton Hotel buildings, both on Norwich Quay, which had to be demolished. It is believed that Independent Fisheries plan to build a commercial or retail development on the site, possibly next year.

Neil McLennan, from the Lyttelton Port Company, advises us that "the building was built by Fletcher Construction for the Lyttelton Harbour Board as "Maritime House" around 1960. It was designed by Hollis and Leonard Architects. Lyttelton Harbour Board used the building to house the Harbour Masters Office, Resident Engineer' Office, and administration. HM Customs, MAF and shipping agents leased other areas of the building. The Lyttelton Harbour Board sold the building to Independent Fisheries in the late 1980's."







Lyttelton Harbour Water Quality

Addressing the Issue of Harbour Water Quality

Harbour water quality has declined as the result of changing land use over the last 100 years mainly because of the quantity of sediment from eroding hillsides which find its way into the harbour via many streams and creeks.

Banks Peninsula Water Management Committee is currently formulating a plan which has the potential to reverse the trend of declining water quality in Lyttelton Harbour.

Fine clay sediment sloshing around on the harbour floor makes life impossible for all but a few of the most adaptable bottom-dwelling species. The action of waves and tides stirs up the sediment making the water cloudy and preventing light from penetrating into the water column. This limits photosynthesis by the microscopic plants which form the basis of the marine food chain and overall ecosystem productivity is reduced.

Our prevailing easterly honking up the harbour pushes the suspended sediment toward the head of the harbour where it is deposited to form ever increasing mudflats. In effect the harbour is filling up with the clay from surrounding hills.

The reduced marine biodiversity of Lyttelton Harbour ecosystem means fewer species of shellfish, fish, marine birds and mammals such as penguins and dolphins.

Sediment comes from a number of different sources. On Banks Peninsula our fine loess soils are especially susceptible to erosion, so anywhere the soil is exposed is vulnerable. Historically, reducing the protective covering of vegetation for pastoral farming has had a major impact, but developments such as quarrying, subdivisions and roadways are also significant contributors.

These processes are happening all over Banks Peninsula, but nowhere is the problem so bad as in Lyttelton Harbour.

In Lyttelton Harbour the water quality of the sea is profoundly influenced by the management of surrounding land, and the variable quality of freshwater inputs. Improving the ecological health of Lyttelton Harbour depends on people making changes to how the land and the streams are managed.

The Banks Peninsula Zone Implementation Plan [the "ZIP"] will set out the Water Management Committee's ideas for how land and water will be managed in the future. The committee is seeking local knowledge, opinions and advice from people living around Lyttelton Harbour to be incorporated into the draft ZIP.

This is your best opportunity to influence the management of land and water locally and to support changes which will result in improved water quality in Lyttelton Harbour. Please support the inclusion of a Lyttelton Harbour/Whakaraupo chapter in the Banks Peninsula Zone Implementation Plan.

Have your say on local water management



The Banks Peninsula Zone Committee wants feedback on its draft Zone Implementation Programme for water management. The committee is hosting four community meetings for local people, groups and organisations to provide feedback on the recommendations made in the draft Zone Implementation Programme.

Banks Peninsula Zone Committee Chairperson Richard Simpson said the completion of the draft Zone Implementation Programme is the culmination of months of hard work by the zone committee. "The Banks Peninsula draft Zone Implementation Programme has been developed following numerous committee meetings and extensive stakeholder and community engagement to gather information about the region's water resource."

"Its recommendations are designed to enable present and future generations the greatest environmental, cultural, social and economic benefits from the region's water. The underlying philosophy of the Canterbury Water Management Strategy is that local communities should be making decisions on local water management. How we manage water has an influence on our quality of life and prosperity both now and for future generations."

"Community input is vital to ensuring our water resource is managed sustainability. We now want to hear what local people like and don't like about the recommendations and whether there are other things they think should be changed," said Richard Simpson.

Once community feedback has been considered the Zone Implementation Programme will be updated and presented to councils as the basis for work programmes and for drafting regional plans. The draft ZIP includes ten chapters, each focussing on a different priority area for water management. The ten chapters are:

Water Quality	Lake Wairewa
Water quantity	Wastewater
Biodiversity	Climate change and flooding
Kaitiakitanga	Education and communication
Erosion and sediment control	Coastal

The Banks Peninsula Zone committee was set up under the Canterbury Water Management Strategy and had its launch in September 2011. The committee consists of five community members, four Rūnanga representatives, and appointees from Environment Canterbury and Christchurch City Council.



SCIRT Works Notice

Ticehurst Road Retaining Wall Repairs



SCIRT are replacing two retaining walls at the top of Ticehurst Road near Ticehurst Terrace. Work is scheduled to begin on Tuesday 23 October 2012 following the completion of the retaining walls further down Ticehurst Road. The work is expected to take five months to complete. A road closure will be in place on Ticehurst Road for the duration of the works (until March 2013). At times parking restrictions will be in place to enable the delivery of materials.

More than 100 retaining walls in Lyttelton have been identified as needing attention as a result of earthquake damage. We are replacing two of these retaining walls, located between Ticehurst Terrace and 28 Ticehurst Road.

To replace the wall SCIRT will first deconstruct the old wall, storing the red rock and removing any vegetation. Once the site has been cleared, the slope is excavated to a safe angle. Reinforcing steel is used to construct the skeleton for the new retaining wall. Concrete block and poured concrete is used to fill the body, and complete the wall. SCIRT then back fill behind the wall. A trench compactor will be used to compact the fill behind the retaining walls. Any vibrations produced should be minimal. The road will then be reinstated.

Work on retaining wall one will be carried out in one stage, whereas retaining wall two will be constructed and backfilled in several small stages.

Retaining Wall One: A road closure will be in place between Flimwell Lane and 28 Ticehurst Road from 23 October 2012 until 21 December 2012.

Retaining Wall Two: A road closure will be in place between Ticehurst Terrace and 35 Ticehurst Road from 7 January 2013 until March 2013.

Flimwell lane will be closed to pedestrians. At times, parking will be unavailable along the lower sections of Ticehurst Road to enable deliveries to take place. Please adhere to all signage and parking restriction notices. No driveway, footpath access or on-street parking will be available within the road closure area. Due to the footpath closure, SCIRT will secure safe pedestrian access by means of a contractor escorting residents through the work site.

Canterbury Street and Ripon Street Retaining Wall Repairs

We have stabilised the road and services since the flooding. The road along Upper Canterbury Street will be repaired and reopened on completion of all of the retaining walls on Canterbury Street. This is expected to be the end of November 2012.

We are continuing with the repair and replacement of the retaining walls in Canterbury and Ripon Streets and will move onto repairing the wall outside the cemetery on Canterbury Street. This will commence on Thursday 11th October 2012.

Lower Canterbury Street Wall: The wall repair is half completed. The expected completion date is late November 2012. Construction is continuing to move upwards along Canterbury Street. The road will continue to be closed to non-construction vehicles

Ripon Street: The wall repair is seventy-five percent complete. We anticipate that works will be complete by late October 2012.

Canterbury Street walls outside and opposite the cemetery: We will be starting work on these walls on Thursday 11th October and expect to complete these works in late November 2012. When work commences, there will be changes to pedestrian routes and access to properties between 75 and 79 Canterbury Street. We will provide an alternative pedestrian route for affected properties. Wastewater is made up of water collected from interior drainage systems, for example toilets, laundries and kitchens, as well as commercial and industrial premises. The Council wants a wastewater system that's socially and culturally acceptable and sustainable for the whole community. The wastewater system also needs to be affordable, reliable and resilient as well as reduce risks to public health.

There are some new challenges following the earthquakes, challenges that need to be managed in the future. With this in mind, the question Christchurch faces is 'how do we sustainably manage our wastewater over the next 10, 30 and 100 years'? The Wastewater Strategy will consider all these factors, and the views of the community, to establish a strategic direction and long-term vision for waste water in Christchurch.

The draft waste water strategy considers these timeframes:

Short-term - The next 10 years will see the city's existing wastewater system return to normal operations, and Christchurch's geography and demographics transition to take on a new shape.

Mid-term - The next 30 years are likely to see non-uniform population growth, reflecting the new red zones and accelerated development areas in the south, west and north of the city.

Long-term - A focus on the next 100 years reflects the long-life nature of wastewater assets – particularly gravity sewers and rising mains. Where these assets are located will be determined by post-quake urban development patterns over the next 10 years. By forecasting what the 100 year wastewater system will look like, including treatment plants and receiving environments, the Council can ensure the 30 year system plan fits with the long-term vision and the major decisions that will be made over the next 10 years.

One Voice Te Reo Kotahi

One Voice Te Reo Kotahi is independent and not aligned with any political party. One Voice Te Reo Kotahi speaks from the Non Government sector - allowing the voices of organisations that have not been formed by Government of Commerce to be heard. A recent study, carried out in this country by Johns Hopkins University, concluded that there were 97,000 such organisations in the country - only 10% of them had any paid staff. We all know how much was done after "our" quake by groups in our sector.

NGOs who agree with the One Voice Te Reo Kotahi kaupapa can put themselves on the One Voice Te Reo Kotahi register. The purpose of the register is to ensure that the numerous NGOs (non-profit organisations) in greater Christchurch can find out about each other and can gather to decide on next steps for One Voice Te Reo Kotahi.

One Voice Te Reo Kotahi functions by consulting with groups and collating responses from them, they provide two-way communication between the NGO sector and government, and commerce – a brokerage role. One Voice Te Reo Kotahi supports and promotes the contribution of organisations in the sector. They advise and inform decision makers of the issues.

Interpretation of Te Reo Kotahi One Voice is simply the waka on which the NGO sector with its many faces [nga matatini] carries community expectations and truths with integrity.

Tatarakihi - The Children of Parihaka

A new documentary from Documentary Edge award-winning producer and director Paora Joseph and executive producer Gaylene Preston, will be screening on Monday 5 November 2012, 6pm at the Hollywood Cinema in Sumner.

In 2009, a group of Taranaki children were taken on a bus trip to visit the places their ancestors, passive resistors from Parihaka in the 1880s, who were imprisoned and forced to labour in places like Addington Jail, the Lyttelton Goal and various buildings, roads and retaining walls that they worked on across Christchurch and Dunedin. Along the way, they were welcomed at local marae by descendants of local Maori who supported the prisoners at the time. It was an emotional journey, documented by Joseph's camera and the children themselves. The narration is by the children, from their writing, poetry, song and art, expressed in a workshop after the journey.

Children, known at Parihaka as "tatarakihi" (cicadas), after their chattering noise, have a special place in the village's history. In 1881 the children of Parihaka greeted the invading Armed Constabulary with white feathers of peace, in accord with the philosophy of passive resistance taught by their two leaders, Te Whiti o Rongomai and Tohu Kākahi

This film, described by NZ Herald's Peter Calder as a "modest and affecting road trip doco", has just completed several sell-out screenings in the New Zealand International Film Festival in Dunedin, Christchurch and Wellington and the grassroots release is in response to demand from Dunedin audiences, who have taken the film to their hearts.

Graeme Tuckett of Dominion Post said: "a gentle film, full of compassion. I cannot recommend it highly enough". And Adam Fresco of flicks.co.nz: "a raw and heartfelt record of a "sacred journey of remembrance"

This film is dedicated to the memory of all who have carried the kaupapa of passive resistance taught by Te Whiti o Rongomai and Tohu Kākahi."

Red Cross gives more help with power and storage bills

News Release: 8 October 2012

The New Zealand Red Cross 2011 Earthquake Commission today approved more help with electricity bills for all households that received its 2012 Winter Assistance Grant. Around 6000 households will receive a second payment of \$400 which will be paid directly to their power company. The previous grant was \$100 for each of the four months of June, July, August and September.

Commission head Sir John Hansen says the second payment is in recognition of the fact many people are still struggling with heating bills, due to living in earthquake-damaged houses. "We are responding to a need our Outreach volunteers are seeing out in the community. There is a great need among the elderly in particular, some of whom are avoiding using heating because of the cost. "People have the option of using the payment now or holding it in credit for next winter."

The Winter Assistance Grant closed on October 1. It was available to all households with earthquake damage or those who had to move to colder, damper, harder to heat accommodation.

The Commission has also approved more help for people with storage bills. It will now pay a grant of up to \$1000 towards earthquake incurred storage bills upon presentation of receipts. Previously the storage grant was up to \$500.

Of the \$125 million donated to the New Zealand Red Cross earthquake appeals, \$16 million remains unallocated. Half this money was donated by Japanese Red Cross a few months ago. The Commission is actively working with Red Cross staff to identify further grants to help the most vulnerable, in particular the young and the elderly.

So far more than \$74 million in grants has been distributed to 88,000 individuals and families. Another \$20 million is ring-fenced for open grants, including those approved today. \$5 million has been spent on recovery programmes including Winter Warmer Packs, the torch radio programme, disaster preparedness and bereaved family support, and another \$10 million is left for upcoming recovery programmes over the next 3 years.
